This program offers a new and innovative method of student learning by engaging and observing and participating in simulations with professionals and experts in their working environment. Students immerse in the decision tasks that political, diplomatic, media, and military personnel face. This program give students practical experience in how to conduct multi-cultural negotiations as well as inter-disciplinary problem solving skills. Students are educated in practical and professional problem solving by simulating an international crisis resolution and strategic communications at a professional level. The comprehensive and diverse nature of the program develops a new learning community for students, a non-traditional classroom experience, and innovative internationalization training at the entrance level for careers in diplomacy, international classroom experience, and innovative international active with a unique skill set for future vocations in international affairs, government, commerce, and the NGO sector. The program aims to give students the preparation to be the next generation of Canadian decision makers at home and in the multilateral setting. This program to sudents from all part in 2017 and in full in 2018 with 32 and 38 students enrolled respectively.
