That SGSC approve the revisions of GGR 1.3.3 (English Language Competence), effective **Summer 2021.** 

### **Summary of Revisions and Rationale:**

The changes will formalize the acceptance of additional English language tests and minimum score requirements, aligning them with what is publically stated by other Canadian institutions. This will allow applicants more options if there are issues with taking TOEFL or IELTS within their country of residence. The test score minimums are in line with other graduate school requirements similar to SFU and matches those required by UBC.

# **General Graduate Regulation Change 1.3.3**

# Summary of change:

Formally adding additional English language proficiency tests in line with other Canadian institutions. No changes to the test scores currently required.

# Rationale for change:

We have been informally accepting these tests for many years, however, as other Canadian institutions publicly state their allowance for these tests we would like to formalize our score requirements. This will allow applicants more options if there are issues with taking TOEFL or IELTS within their country of residence. The test score minimums are in line with other graduate school requirements similar to SFU's and matches that required by UBC.
