The course introduces the foundational concepts in probability as required by many modern applications in computing. Prerequisite: MACM 101, MATH 152, <u>CMPT 125 or CMPT 135</u>, and <u>(MATH 240 or MATH 232)</u>, all with a minimum grade of C-.

We are proposing that we make amendments to the current course title and calendar description of CRIM 311: Minorities and the Criminal Justice System. The changes align with providing an anti-racist and critical lens into these issues. The proposed changes seek to problematize systemic inequalities and discrimination within the CJS and society's representation of inequalities, rather than problematizing the individual. The foundational aspects of the course and description remain the same, but the proposed changes could present a more appropriate and informed approach to discussing these issues in a critical way.

Course Title Change: Rationale

Although we recognize the intention of using the term 'minorities' as a catch-all to discuss the experiences of different groups within society and their 'relationship' with the criminal justice system, the positioning of this terminology as a course title is potentially harmful to various communities and students. Given the impact of systemic discrimination, systemic racism, systems of oppression, among others, various communities are deemed 'minority' groups, seemingly problematizing the individual, rather than society's representation, classification, and positioning of these groups. As the title stands, the focus of issue seems to rest on the individual (which may inaccurately depict the intention behind the course), rather than on the histories of discrimination and oppression rooted in our societies, and their interactions with the criminal justice system. We wish to bring a critical lens to this and position the problem as one of society and the system, rather than on the individual (which again, may be the true purpose of the course, but misrepresented through the current title). The new faculty member who is teaching the course is a woman of colour, and states that reading this title feels harmful and unsettling. Thus, we propose a need for changing the title of this course – to not only mitigate the impact of the positioning of the language in the title, but also to be more representative of what the course is truly about and how it is taught. The inherent purpose of the course is to critically analyze the intersections between social inequalities and exclusion and the criminal justice system, grounded in discussions of the impact of systemic racism, discrimination and oppression of different, diverse groups in Canada – this should be the focus of the title.

Calendar Description Change: Rationale

As noted above, the purpose of the course is to expose and engage students to/in an analysis of the intersection of identities and the criminal justice system through centering the experiences of people who experience social exclusion and inequity in the CJS due to systemic and structural/systemic discrimination and oppression. Embedded within these discussions would be drawing connections between structural inequalities across systems and in society, reflected in the CJS (policies, practices, treatment of certain groups), as well as an emphasis on social inequalities and social harms as societal problems. As such, we feel that there are a few areas of the description that should be modified or added. If discussing a number of social inequalities or inequities, we believe that the description should be more inclusive to other groups, across different social locations and identities. Some of the language in the description is outdated and potentially harmful. Currently, the calendar description is not reflective of the course outcomes/learning objectives. The calendar description should send the message that this course is an analysis of criminal justice (system), social exclusion, and inequalities within the system through identifying forms of discrimination and oppression, practices, and policies that perpetuate or mitigate inequitable treatment in the system. The course description should seek to take a critical perspective on addressing the inequitable experiences within the system.

It will show how the structure and internal processes of an organization are linked to and partially determined by forces in the external environment of the organization. Contextual factors such as the technology and corporate strategy of the organization will also be examined. Organizations, not individuals, are this course's basic unit of analysis. We will seek to answer questions about organizations, such as why they exist, what objectives they pursue, how they function, how they survive and grow, who they interact with, how they interact with each other, how they are evaluated, and how they respond to failure. In answering these questions, the course will introduce students to major theoretical perspectives and issues studied in organizational theory. Prerequisite: 45 units; BUS 272 (or 372) with a minimum grade of C-.
