2022/23 Grades Report:

Executive Summary of Undergraduate and Graduate Course Grades

2013/14 to 2022/23

This report summarizes patterns in student course grades at Simon Fraser University over the ten-year period from 2013/14 to 2022/23¹. Grades are reported on a GPA scale. SFU faculty, staff, and senators can access a report with more detailed tables and charts (https://www.sfu.ca/irp/students/grades-report.html).

Effect of the COVID-19 Pandemic

- A combination of changes to grading policies and other effects of the pandemic has coincided with a bump in average course grades at the undergraduate level.
- This bump occurs in both lower division (LD) and upper division (UD) courses.
- The pattern is seen in every faculty.
- The increase in average grade awarded begins in 2019/20 2020/21, then tapers off, so that by 2022/23 the grades appear to be following their pre-pandemic patterns.

10-Year Patterns

- Even ignoring the grading pattern associated with the COVID-19 pandemic, over the past ten years, the average grade awarded in courses has shown a gradually increasing trend in all faculties at the undergraduate level, and most faculties at the graduate level.
- Comparing grades in 2013/14 versus 2022/23, all *increases* of at least 0.25 occur at the lower division level, and include average course grades awarded by:
 - the Faculty of Education (+0.53),
 - o the Faculty of Environment (+0.29), and
 - the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences (+0.25)
- There are no faculty-level *decreases* of at least 0.25.
- Over the last decade, the Faculty of Education has consistently awarded the highest average grades in both undergraduate and graduate courses.
- In most years, the *lowest* average course grades have been awarded by:
 - o LD: the Faculty of Science
 - UD: the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences
 - o Grad: the Beedie School of Business
- Graduate courses have consistently awarded higher average grades than upper division courses, which have awarded higher average grades than lower division courses, in all faculties.

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¹ This report only includes grades with a numeric equivalent, plus P/CR/NC grades due to the Elective Grade System or the one-time Spring 2020 grading policy; only grades with a numeric equivalent are included in averages.

2022/23 Course Grades

- The average course grade this year was 2.95 in undergraduate courses (LD: 2.84; UD: 3.12), and 3.73 in graduate courses.
- Among faculties, the Faculty of Education awarded the highest proportion of A grades and the highest average grades this year at all three course levels (LD, UD, Grad).
- The lowest average grades were awarded by:
 - LD and UD: the Faculty of Science; this faculty also awarded the highest proportion of D and F grades (combined) at both the lower and upper division levels
 - Grad: the Beedie School of Business
- The subjects awarding the highest and lowest average grades this year were:
 - Highest average grades:
 - LD: TEKX (3.97)
 - UD: MASC (4.19)
 - Grad: PSYC (4.15)
 - Lowest average grades:
 - LD: MACM (2.34)
 - UD: MACM (2.48)
 - Grad: FREN (3.52)
 - o Note that FREN and MASC at these levels awarded fewer than 20 grades this year.
- A few course subjects have shown a large change (at least 0.40) in average grade awarded from last year to this year.
- Subjects with a large *increase* include:
 - HUM (Grad: +0.86),
 - NUSC (UD: +0.56), and
 - o PUNJ (LD: +0.45)
- Subjects with a large *decrease* include:
 - JAPN (UD: -0.46).
- Note that HUM awarded fewer than 20 grades at the graduate level each year, so significant year-to-year variability is not unexpected.
- Courses offered by the Faculty of Environment had the highest use of the Elective Grade System this year; P/CR/NC grades made up 4% of their undergraduate course grades (LD: 5%; UD: 3%).
- Groups of undergraduate students who were most likely to make use of the Elective Grade Policy in their undergraduate courses were:
 - Faculty of Communication, Art and Technology students taking Faculty of Environment courses (11%) and Faculty of Health Sciences courses (9%),
 - Beedie School of Business students taking Faculty of Environment courses (8%), and
 - Faculty of Applied Sciences students taking Faculty of Environment courses (8%).

Student Faculty vs Course Faculty (Undergraduate Students in Undergraduate Courses)

- Student Faculty:
 - Students in a given faculty most frequently took courses from their own faculty.
 - Students from all faculties received their highest average grades in Faculty of Education courses.
- Course Faculty:
 - Courses in a given faculty were most often taken by students from that same faculty
 - The exception is courses from the Faculty of Environment, which were most frequently taken by students from the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences.
 - In terms of how courses in each faculty awarded grades to students from different faculties:
 - Courses in the Faculty of Applied Sciences awarded the highest average grades to Faculty of Applied Sciences students.
 - Courses in the faculties of Science, Environment, and Arts and Social Sciences awarded their highest average grades to students from the Faculty of Science.
 - Courses from the remaining faculties awarded their highest average grades to students from the Beedie School of Business.
