## Rationale for change:

As part of our process to develop an updated revision of our Minor and Major programs, the name changes are suggested to better reflect the breadth of our field, the changes within it, as well as to be more inclusive of new faculty and student interests.

Our revised programs seek to promote an inter/intra-national and inter/intra-disciplinary approach to the investigation of French language and culture in all their diversity, which will offer students opportunities to examine the Francophone world (La Francophonie) in a global context, while also exploring the specificities of more local contexts (Québec, Haïti, Polynesia, etc.) and bearing in mind the complexities of immigration, refugee status, language politics, etc.

Importantly, to better reflect and promote our revised programs, we need to also rename them, so as to alert students of their broader focus, which is essential for promoting recruitment.

As such, we are proposing a new title proposed for both the Major and the Minor, "in French and Francophone Studies".

Rationale for change:

1. Following the external evaluation of the Department of French, which took place in April 2022, a report was drawn up by the evaluators. In this report, the evaluators recommended updating the department's courses and programs. The changes proposed below are in direct response to the external evaluators' recommendations and suggestions. They are also in line with the guidelines we have received from the Dean's office.
2. The changes proposed below are also a response to the crisis in student enrolment in the department. The number of enrolments per semester in the department's programs is far too low. The aim of the proposed changes is therefore to increase enrolment in both the Major and Minor programs.
3. The proposed changes are also designed to rethink the way the French language is taught (in particular the sequence of language courses at the 100 and 200 levels) and to offer students greater flexibility in the creation of personalized pathways. We no longer wish to work in "silos" but rather in an interdisciplinary way, something that the students themselves have been asking for. We are therefore adapting our program structure to better respond to today's students' expectations.
4. In addition, the entry points to both programs have also been revised. This is an important element to emphasize, because we will be working with other programs and departments that may be affected by the proposed changes. In this way, we want to privilege collaboration.
5. Finally, in order to better reflect the breadth of our field, we are proposing a new title proposed for both the Major and the Minor, "in French and Francophone Studies" (see Program Name Change Form attached)

## French Language Minor French and Francophone Studies Minor

This program is for students who are enrolled in a degree program (other than French) and who wish to develop an in-depth knowledge of the French language.

This program is not intended
a) for students deemed native speakers
b) for students who completed grade-12 French Immersion

And, normally, it is not intended for students whose point of entry is FREN 210 or above.

This minor in French language cannot be combined with another minor in French studies.

Recommendations for the award of this minor will be made by the Department of French and the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences.

Program Requirements

A minimum of GPA 2.0, calculated on all Simon Fraser University courses that are applied to a minor, is required for successful completion of the program.

Curriculum Requirements

Students starting at an introductory level must complete the requirements leading to FREN Z10 FREN 245 or FREN 275 before taking the courses required for the minor. This may include a placement test, completing other lower division coursework, or a combination of the placement test and coursework. Please refer to the Academic Calendar.

Students will have to complete the 12 six lower division units and 1518 upper division units required to obtain the minor in French language and Francophone Studies.

Course Exemptions
It is possible to obtain exemption, up to a maximum of 12 units, from lower division French language courses by being placed in a more advanced French language course (Placement
test). Students who gain, or hope to gain, course exemption should consult the advisor early.

Transfer Credits

Approved transfer credits for French courses completed at another post-secondary institution (subject to university transfer credits regulations) up to maximum of six units.

Note: A minimum of 15 upper division units is required, nine of which must be taken within the department.

Students may be formally admitted to the program after successfully completing FREN 210 FREN 245 or FREN 275 (or its equivalent), with a minimum grade of $C$ or better.
