RATIONALE (must be included)

Following the external evaluation of the Department of French, which took place in April 2022, a report was drawn up by the evaluators. In this report, the evaluators recommended updating the department's courses and programs. The proposed changes are in direct response to the external evaluators' recommendations and suggestions. They are also in line with the guidelines we have received from the Dean's office.

The proposed title change is to better reflect the complexity of the French language and *La Francophonie* and its multiple facets. We no longer wish to work in silos but rather in an interdisciplinary way, something that the students themselves have been asking for. We are thus adapting our programs and courses to better respond to our students' expectations. The proposed prerequisites change is to allow students more flexibility in their pathways, and to create easier entry points into the programs and courses of their choice, while taking into account their past education and knowledge of French. The aim of this is to also increase enrolment in our programs and courses.



Centring both the exploitation involved in the extraction of land and division of labor, and the modes of belonging and resistance of where migrants and women as well as immigrants, the course explores the gendered, economic, border and racial regimes involved in contemporary global migration and nationbuilding. women tend to be exploited in numerous forms, ranging from lack of eitizenship rights and erosion of skills to the risk of sexual assault, due to immigration/migration and social policies of various countries. Prerequisite: 15 units. Students with credit for WS 320 Special Topics: Immigrant Women and Economic Security may not complete this course for further credit.
