Action undertaken by the Senate Committee on Undergraduate Studies at its meeting of September 17, 2002 gives rise to the following motion:

## Motion

"that Senate approve the proposed changes to regulations governing Academic Standing \& Continuance as set forth in S. 02-74 , in effect as of Summer Semester 2003."

## Background

A generally similar proposal was approved by SCUS and considered by Senate in May 2002. The proposal was referred back to SCUS for re-drafting because Senators found its language to be confusing. The wording had been changed very little from the existing Calendar regulation. This revision has been substantially edited and SCUS members are confident that it is much improved.

SCUS made the following substantive changes to the earlier document:

- abolish the academic standing 'Ineligible to Re-register' (INW) applied when a student withdraws voluntarily in three consecutive semesters. A rationale is given below.
- admit all new students in good academic standing (currently a few are admitted on Academic Probation if the admission average is below 2.00)
- implementation date moves from Fall to Summer 2003 to reflect the first semester that grades are expected be collected and academic standing determined under the new student information system.


## Summary of previous proposal

- Abolish the "review period" and the "review period grade point average (RGPA)"
- Replace RGPA with the semester grade point average (SGPA)
- Abolish the ING and INF standings


## Summary of additional measures

- Abolish the INW standing
- Admit all new students in good academic standing
- Implement in Summer 2003, not Fall 2003


## Rationale

Our regulations have proven to be exceedingly complex and are barely comprehensible to students, faculty and staff. They require a multi-page booklet to provide explanation and examples, but even this exposition usually also requires a very careful explanation by a welltrained advisor. The review period has a different, complex duplicate course rule. The critical "review period gpa", is unreported to students until they are "Required to Withdraw". Consequently, very few members of our undergraduate community understand what is required to remain within it.

The current regulations are also inconsistent. While the complexity of the regulations is intended to provide a measure of fairness, whether the student takes five courses per semester or only one or two, the provisions for a minimum length of review period are over-ridden by two special standings, "ING" and "INF" which discontinue some students even before they are placed on Academic Probation. Hence, as no formal warning is given to a student who is at risk from ING or INF, the opportunity might be lost for that student to receive specific advising about, for example, more careful course planning. Hence, our current regulations are less than fair to all students.

SCUS learned that the academic standing 'Ineligible to Re-register' (INW) applied when a student withdraws voluntarily in three consecutive semesters, affects very few students and that, having no direct connection to academic performance, it was not consistent with the purposes of the academic standing regulations. Indeed, if a student with a good record should withdraw for legitimate medical reasons in two successive semesters, the regulation implied that it was better for that student to fail all of her/his courses rather than seek a third withdrawal, however legitimate the reasons might be.

Simple modelling indicates that typical outcomes will be similar. Some students might be favoured and others marginally disadvantaged by the changes, but overall, if one assumes that students will better comprehend the outcomes of weak academic performance, it can be only beneficial to all involved.

Implementation in Summer 2003 of a new Student Information System provides a timely opportunity to introduce these changes.

## Standing Required for Continuance

The following procedures are in effect beginning Summer semester 2003.
Every student is expected to maintain an acceptable standard of scholarship. Specifically, a student must maintain a minimum CGPA of 2.00. A student who does not do so shall be considered to be performing unsatisfactorily in her/his studies.

- upon first admission to Simon Fraser University, a student shall be placed in good academic standing
- academic performance shall be evaluated on Simon Fraser University courses that have assigned grades ('assigned grades' include grades A+ through to D, F, DE, and N, but exclude $P, W, C R, A E$, CC, GN and AU)
- formal evaluation of academic standing shall take place only if a student has accumulated a minimum of nine semester hours of credit in courses having assigned grades


## Academic Alert

A student whose semester grade point average (SGPA) falls below 2.00, but who is not placed on any of the academic standings given below shall receive an 'academic alert' notification and shall be advised to seek guidance at the Academic Resource Office.

## Academic Probation

A student who has a CGPA of less than 2.00 shall be placed on academic probation (OAP). A student on academic probation may not register in a course overload. A student on OAP standing may not receive a 'letter of permission' to attend another university or college.

## Required to Withdraw

A student may be required to withdraw (RTW) after one or more semesters on academic probation (OAP) (see 'outcomes for a student on academic probation' below). A student on RTW standing may not receive a 'letter of permission' to attend another university or college.

## Extended Withdrawal

A student may be placed on extended withdrawal (EW) after s/he is required to withdraw (RTW), is re-admitted and subsequently is on academic probation (OAP) for one or more semesters (see 'outcomes for a student on academic probation' below). A student on EW standing may not receive a 'letter of permission' to attend another university or college.

## Outcomes for a student on academic probation

A student on academic probation shall be evaluated at the end of each semester.
If at the end of the semester,

- the SGPA and the CGPA are each 2.00 or higher, the student shall be in good academic standing
- the SGPA is 2.00 or higher, but the CGPA is less than 2.00 , the student shall continue on academic probation
- the SGPA is less than 2.00 , but the CGPA is 2.00 or higher, the student shall continue on academic probation. (This could occur if a student repeats a course.)
- both the SGPA and the CGPA are less than 2.00, the student shall be required to withdraw (RTW) from the University or, if previously required to withdraw (RTW), shall be placed on extended withdrawal (EW).


## Re-admission of Involuntarily Withdrawn Students

A former student who is involuntarily withdrawn from the University (required to withdraw, ineligible to re-register or placed on extended withdrawal) may apply for re-admission based on the performance achieved in external academic course work completed after s/he last registered at Simon Fraser University (see below for details).

## Re-admission after Required to Withdraw

A former student who is required to withdraw (RTW) shall be eligible for re-admission if s/he completes externally further transferable academic work according to the following schedule (any of the following five options)

- 12-17 credit hours with a minimum 3.50 GPA
- 18-23 credit hours with a minimum 3.00 GPA
- $24-29$ credit hours with a minimum 2.75 GPA or with the acceptance GPA (see 'acceptance GPA' below), whichever is higher
- 30 or more credit hours with the acceptance GPA
- a completed 2 year technical diploma with a $70 \%$ minimum average and at least 12 credit hours of transferable course work with a minimum 2.75 GPA. (The transferable work may be within the diploma program or supplementary to it.)


## Re-admission of Students on Extended Withdrawal

A former student on extended withdrawal (EW) shall be eligible for re-admission if s/he completes externally further transferable academic work according to the following schedule (any of the following five options)

- 24-35 credit hours with a minimum 3.50 GPA
- 36-47 credit hours with a minimum 3.00 GPA
- 48 - 59 credit hours with a minimum 2.75 GPA or with the acceptance GPA (see 'acceptance GPA' below), whichever is higher
- 60 or more credit hours with the acceptance GPA
- a completed 2 year technical diploma with a $70 \%$ minimum average and at least 24 credit hours of transferable course work with a minimum 2.75 GPA. (The transferable work may be within the diploma program or supplementary to it.)


## Acceptance GPA

The acceptance GPA refers to the minimum admission GPA in effect for that semester for British Columbia college transfer students, according to enrolment limitation measures. The acceptance GPA may vary.

## Re-admission Deadlines

Deadlines for consideration shall be the same as for other students seeking re-admission (see 'Admission \& Re-admission' above)

## Duplicate Courses for Re-admission

A repeated attempt at a course, which was passed with a grade of C or higher prior to leaving Simon Fraser University, shall not count in the credit hour or GPA calculation for re-admission.

## Final Grades Evaluated for Re-admission

Assessment for re-admission shall be based only on final grades (i.e. courses in progress are not evaluated.)
Transfer Credit on Re-admission
Credit for transferable courses shall be granted on re-admission, subject to a C minimum grade in each course and subject to normal transfer credit limits.

## Standing on Re-admission

If re-admitted, a student who was previously involuntarily withdrawn from Simon Fraser University (RTW or EW) shall be placed on academic probation (OAP) and shall again be subject to the conditions described above.

A comparison follows, showing existing vs. proposed regulations

## Current regulations

Students are expected to maintain acceptable standards of scholarship. Specifically, they must maintain a minimum 2.00 CGPA. A student who does not do so will be considered to be performing unsatisfactorily in his/her studies. Regulations are applied to obtain reasonable equitability between transfer and non-transfer students. The following procedures apply for evaluating student performance in accordance with the policy governing continuance, withdrawal and readmission.

## (changed order)

- academic performance will be evaluated on courses for which Simon Fraser University grades have been assigned. ('assigned grade' will include grades $A+$ through to $\mathrm{D}, \mathrm{F}, \mathrm{DE}$, and $N$, but will exclude $P, W, C R, A E, C C$, GN and AU )
- following admission, no formal assessment will take place until the student has completed a minimum of nine credit hours of assigned grades
- transfer students who were admitted to the University under the 'special entry' category with an admission average below 2.00 and who have attempted nine or more credit hours of transfer credit will be admitted on academic probation


## Repeated Withdrawals

Students who withdraw from all courses in three consecutive semesters of registration will be ineligible to re-register.

Ineligible to Re-register
A student with a CGPA average of less than 1.0 in two consecutive semesters of registration, or with only N or F grades in two consecutive semesters, will be ineligible to re-register.

## Academic Probation

A student who has received assigned grades for at least nine Simon Fraser University credit hours will be placed on academic probation if the CGPA average earned is lower than 2.00 . During the probation period, the student must complete a minimum of nine Simon Fraser University credit hours of assigned grades before reassessment will occur. A student on academic probation may not repeat a course for which a grade of C or higher has been assigned. A student on academic probation may not register in a course overload.

If at the end of the probation period,

- the grade point average on assigned grades during the probation period and the CGPA average (CGPA) are 2.00 or higher, the student will be considered to be in good academic standing.
- the grade point average on assigned grades during the probation period is 2.00 or higher, but the CGPA is less than 2.00, the student will continue on academic probation
- the grade point average on assigned grades during the probation period is less than 2.00 , but the CGPA is 2.00 or higher, the student will continue on academic probation. (This could apply to students repeating courses during the probation period.)
- both the grade point average on assigned grades during the probation period and the CGPA are less than 2.00 , the student will be required to withdraw (RTW) from the University


## Required to Withdraw

After receiving Simon Fraser University assigned grades for at least 18 credit hours (nine if admitted on academic probation), a student may be required to withdraw (RTW) after being placed on academic probation.

## Academic Alert

A students whose semester grade point average (SGPA)s falls below 2.00, but who are is not placed on any of the academic standings given below, will shall receive an 'academic alert' notification and will shall be advised to seek eounselling guidance at the Academic Resource Office.

## Academic Probation

A student who has feceived assigned grades for at teast mine Simen Fraser University eredit hours a CGPA of less than 2.00 shall will be placed on academic probation (OAP) if the GGPA average earnedis lower than 2.00. A student on RTW standing may not receive a 'letter of permission' to attend another university or college.

## Extended Withdrawal

A student must have received Simon Fraser University assigned grades for at least 27 credit hours (or 27 credit hours and transfer credits combined). A student may be placed on extended withdrawal (EW) after first having been required to withdraw (RTW) and then readmitted.

## Outcomes for a student on academic probation

A student on academic probation shall be evaluated at the end of each semester.
If at the end of the probation peried, semester

## Readmission of Involuntarily Withdrawn Students

Former students who are have been involuntarily withdrawn from the University (required to withdraw, ineligible to re-register, or placed on extended withdrawal) will be considered for readmission based on the amount (credit hours of credit) and quality of performance achieved (GPA) in academic course work completed after the student last registered at Simon Fraser University.

## Required to Withdraw or Ineligible to Re-register Students

Former students who are required to withdraw (RTW) or ineligible to re-register (ING)(i.e. CGPA of less than 1.0 in two consecutive semesters) will be eligible for readmission if they complete further transferable academic work according to the following schedule (any of the following five options)

- $12-17$ credit hours with a minimum 3.50 GPA
- $18-23$ credit hours with a minimum 3.00 GPA
- $24-29$ credit hours with a minimum 2.75 GPA or with the acceptance GPA,* whichever is higher
- 30 or more credit hours with the acceptance GPA,*
- a completed 2 year technical diploma with a $70 \%$ minimum average and at least 12 credit hours of transferable course work with a minimum 2.75 GPA. (The transferable work may be within the diploma program or supplementary to it.)

Former students who are ineligible to re-register (INF only N or F grades in two consecutive semesters) or withdraw voluntarily (INW) in three consecutive semesters) whose Simon Fraser University CGPAs are below 2.00 will be eligible for readmission on the same basis as required to withdraw (RTW) and ineligible to re-register (ING) former students (see above.) If their CGPAs are 2.00 or higher, they will be eligible for readmission if they complete at least 3 credit hours of further transferable work at a minimum 2.00 GPA.

## Ineligible-to-Re-register Students

## Current regulations/cont

## Deadlines

Deadlines for consideration will be the same as for other students seeking readmission. Decisions will be mailed or applicants will be phoned, depending on the date of the decision.

## Duplicate Courses

Duplicate courses (repeated attempts at courses which have been passed prior to leaving Simon Fraser University with a grade of C or higher) will not count in the credit hour or GPA calculations in readmission cases.

## Final Grades Evaluated

Assessment will be based only on final grades (i.e. course in progress will not be evaluated.)

## Transfer Credit

Credit for transferable courses will be granted on readmission, subject to a $C$ minimum grade in each course, and subject to normal transfer credit limits. Letters of permission will not be issued to students who are not in good academic standing.

## Standing on Readmission

If readmitted, students will be placed on academic probation and will be subject to the conditions described above. If both the CGPA and the GPA on assigned grades are below 2.00 at the end of the probation period, the student will be placed on extended withdrawal (EW) or required to withdraw (RTW), as appropriate.

## Academic Alert

Students whose semester GPAs fall below 2.00, but who are not on any of the above academic standings, will receive an 'academic alert' notification and will be advised to seek counselling at the Academic Resource Office.
