1. Deletion of the joint MRM/MBA degree

Rationale

Admissions to this program were suspended in 1999. The School of Resource and Environmental Management and the Faculty of Business administration have now both agreed that this program should be deleted from the calendar. There has been very little demand for the joint degree (3 students since 1993), and because of changes to the curriculum in Business Administration (the suspension of 500 level courses) students are no longer eligible to enter the joint degree program from MRM. It could take up to 4 years to complete the degree because there are up to 17 required courses and a thesis. A student could complete an MRM and an MBA in the time it takes to complete the combined degree.
