Action undertaken by the Senate Committee on Enrollment Management and Planning and the Senate Committee on Academic Planning gives rise to the following motion:

## Motion:

> "that Senate approve and recommend to the Board of Governors, as set forth in S. $99-30$ that the $15 \%$ cap on Category 1 admissions to the Faculty of Business Administration be removed- and replaced by the requirement that the maintenance CGPA for Category 1 students be raised to B-(2.67) until these students have completed all the lower division require ments (with the exception of Bus 207 and Bus 254)"

At its December 1997 meeting, Senate approved a proposal outlining new admission criteria for undergraduate students seeking entry to the Faculty of Business Administration. The proposal called for the admission of students to the Faculty from four streams:
-Category 1 Direct from Secondary School
-Category 2 Direct from College

- Category 3 Internal transfer for students who have taken all their courses at SFU.
- Category 4 Internal transfer for students who have taken some courses at SFU and some courses from other post-secondary institutions.

However, at the time of approval, the Senate motion was amended to include a $15 \%$ limit on students admitted from the Category 1 stream-direct from secondary school.

The Senate Committee on Enrollment Management and Planning, having been charged with recommending to SCAP annual targets for the admission of new students into undergraduate programs and Faculties at SFU, believes that the $15 \%$ cap on Category 1 admissions into the Faculty of Business Administration unnecessarily ties its hands in terms of its role in setting annual targets, particularly since no other Faculty at SFU has such limits imposed on it. Furthermore, Senate now reviews admissions targets and proportions of admissions by category on a regular basis and therefore the stated restriction is no longer necessary.

## Motion 1.

"That SCAP approve and recommend approval to Senate that the 15\% cap on Category 1 admissions to the Faculty of Business Administration be removed."

Re: Future Faculty Admission Plans

In response to your request about the future admission plans for the Faculty of Business Administration, I am sending you my plans up to 2000/2001. You will notice that the total admissions in 98/99 and 99/00 are higher. The reason for this increase is that the direct admissions from high school do not have any impact on our FTEs until they start taking 300 and 400 level courses. These two years represent the faze in of these students into our admission level. In 2000/2001, we will reduce the number of students we will admit in Category 3 to recognize the students that were admitted two years earlier as Category 1 students.

## NEW ADMISSION CRITERIA

## Admission Information

## Criteria

Surdents will be selected competitively from one of four streams:

* Category 1 - Direct from Secondary School: A portion of the annual admission will be selected from secondary school graduates based on the general SFU admission requirements plus Mathematics 12*.
Category 2 -Direct from College:
A portion of the amual admission will be selected from students transferring from community colleges or technical institutes. These students muss have completed all of the lower division requirement courses (except BUS 207 and 254 which may be completed after Faculty admission**). Students will be selected competitively based on the SFU admission grade point average.
Category 3 - All courses at SFU:
A portion of the annual admission will be selected from suxdenrs who have completed all of their courses at SFU including the lower division requirement courses (except BUS 207 and 254 which may be completed after Faculty admission**). Students will be selected competitively based on the cumulative grade point average.
Category 4 - Some courses at SFU and some courses at other post-secondary instimtions: A portion of the annual admission will be selected from students who have completed some courses at SFU and some courses at other post-secondary institutions including the lower division requirement courses (except BUS 207 and 254 which may be completed after Faculty admission**). Students will be selected based on a grade point average which will be a combination of grades eared at SFU and at other instimtions.

To be considered for admission to the Faculty, students in Categories 2,3 and 4 must have completed each lower division requirement course with a minimum C- (C minus) grade. The number of undergraduate students granted entry to the Faculty is limited to 400 to 600 new students per academic year.
*or equivalent Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate courses as listed under General Admission Requirements for British Columbia Secondary Schools.
**if BUS 207 and/or 254 have been taken, they will be calculated into the GPA used for admission to the Faculty.

Application Procedures
Students applying under Category 1 or 2, should apply to the Faculty at the same time that they apply for admission to SFU.
Students applying under Category 3 or 4, should apply to the Faculty after completing their thirtieth semester hour and before completing the sixtieth hour. Students should apply during the semester in which the lower division requirements, as listed below (except BUS 207 and 254) are completed. Surdents not accepted upon initial application may re-apply. Unsuccessful applicants may appeal through the Faculty Appeals Committee.

## Rationale:

Currently the Faculty of Business Administration admits students after thiey bave completed the lower division courses. Their admission is based solely on their cumulative GPA with the CGPA for SFU courses raking precedence over the CGPA of rransferred in courses. Grades eamed on courses taken via Lemers of Permission are not included in cither the SFU CGPA or the transferred in CGPA. This criteria for admission has resulted in some inequities that we want to correct.

The Faculty used the facilities of the Analytical Sundies department to better understand the educational background of our admitted smudents. That research determined that students who came to SFU directly from Secondary School did better on average in our Program than those who came from Colleges. We therefore want to capoure the Secondary School students quicker by admituing them directly to the Faculty. We think that this change will allow us to attract more Secondary School sudents who will be scholarship winners.

The research also revealed that the grades eamed in courses at the colleges tended to be higher than the grades earned in the equivalent courses taken ar SFU. This creabed an inequity in our admission criteria. Sudents who tale all of their courses at SFU recognize that students who have taken some conses at a college have a better chance of being admitred into the Faculty. To help control this inequity, we are allocating a segment of our admissions to students who have taken all of their courses at SFU.

For those students who have taken some courses at SFU and some at a college we want to calculate a GPA which will inclnde all of the courses taken at the various instiontions. Because of the higher grades from the colleges we want to reduce each college grade slightly before calculating the global GPA. This will bring the two sets of grades closer into alignment. The GPA used for admission will include grades earned on courses raken at SFU, those transferred in from other institutions and those taken under Letters of Permission.

We also want to aturact sudients from the colleges who have completed all of the required lower division courses. A portion of the amual admission will, therefore, be reserved for these students. Most students who start at a college do not complete all of the required courses before coming to SFU. The number of students who would fall invo this category is therefore not very large.

The approximate percentages suggested for each group will be adjusted over time as the pool of suudenss from which the selection is made changes. These percentages as well as other information with respect to application criteria will be made available to studems via a web page and information brochures.
