## M.SC. (KDVESIOTOGY) PROGRAM

From The nowal minimum requirements for the M.Sc. (Kin) are 18 semester hours of graduate courges and a thesis. At least 9 credit hours will be selected from the graduate course offerings in Kinesiology. These and courses in ancillary areas will be chosen in consultation with the candidate's supervirory Comaittee. On the recommendation of the Supervisory comittee and with prior approval of the DGPC, a student may be permitted to include up to 6 credit hours of upper division undergraduate courses as part of the 18 credit hours required. For further infomation and regulations, refer to General Pegulations section.

The normal minimum requirements for the M.Sc. (Kin.)
are 18 semester hours of graduate courses and a thesis. At least 9 credit hours will be selected from graduate course offerings in Kinesiology. Courses will be chosen by the candidate's Supervisory Comaittee in consultation with the candidate. On the recommendation of the Supervisory Committee and with prior approval of the DGPC, a student may be permitted to include up to 6 credit hours of upper division undergraduate courses as part of the 18 credit hours required. Note that these undergraduate courses do not affect the CGPA required for the student's continuation or graduation. For further information and regulations; refer to General Regulations Section.

## THESIS

Froms The candidate will prepare a thesis proposal which will be circulated to faculty and resident graduate students, and will present this proposel for discusaion at a Department colloquium.
Upon coupletion of the thesis, formal presentation will be made to the Examining Committee, and any other individuals, at a Departmental colloquium. For further infomation and regulations, refer to General Regulations.

Prior to beginning formal research, the candidate will prepare a thesis proposal which will be circulated to faculty and resident graduate students. The thesis proposal will be formally presented for discussion at a Departmental open forum.
Upon completion of the thesis, a formal defense of the work will be made to the Examination committee at an open Departmental forum.

PH.D. PROGRAM
DEGREE REQUIREMENTS
Candidates will be admitted to the doctoral program in an area defined and determined prior to acceptance by the Departmental Graduate Program Committee. The program must be within the capabilities of the student and the Department. The Ph. D. candidate will be expected to show competence in methodology relevant to the proposed research.

From: A Ph.D. candidate must complete a minimum of 24 semester hours of work beyond the B.Sc. degree. Of the 24 hours, at least 15 must be in Kinesiology courses numbered 800 or above. The remaining 9 hours may be chosen from courses at the graduate or upper division undergraduate level from any department in the University at the discretion of the candidate's Supervisory Committee.

A student may be directed to acquire an adequate knowlegge of a language which would be relevant to his/her studies.

The program of formal course work and research is designed to suit the background and research objectives of each candidate and may differ widely from candidate to candidate.

To:

> A Ph. D. candidate must normally complete a minimum of 24 semester hours of work beyond the B.Sc. degree. Of the 24 hours, at least 15 must be in Kinesiology courses numbered 800 or above. The formal course work will be designed to meet the needs of the students. Therefore, programs may differ widely from candidate to candidate.

Fron: The candidate will present at least two seminars on topics selected in consultation with his/her Supervisory Comittee. The seminars will be presented at an open seminar, nomally in the period between the first and aixth semesters, but in any case before the qualifying examinations. Both the timing and the subject matter of the seminars will be chosen by the student in consultation with the Supervisory Comittee.

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sach Ph.D. candidate will present two seminars in addition to the dissertation proposal on topics approved by the candidate's Supervisory Comittee. These semunars will be presented during the regularly scheduled departmental seminar time, normally between the first and sixth semesters. Both the timing and the subject matter of the seminars will be chosen by the Supervisory Comittee in consultation with the candidate.

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At a time sot by the Supervisory Comittee, nommally at the end of the second year of residence, the candidate will be required to sit written and cral qualifying examinations. The qualifying Examination Comittee will consist of at least four faculty menbers from the Department, including the senior Supervisory (who will be the Comittee Chairperson), plus one faculty muber to be drawn from outside the Department. normally by the end of 6 semesters of residence, the candidate will be required to sit written and oral qualifying examinations. The qualifying Examination Comittee, consisting of a minimum of five people, will be comprised of at least four Faculty members from the Department including the Senior Supervisor (who will act as the Committee Chairperson) and the Departmental Graduate Program Chairperson (or designate), plus one faculty member from outside the Department.

## (a) Mrittan

From: In conmultation with the Supervisory Committee, the candidate will select ane of the following two options:
(1) Basearch Problem: The Qualifying Examination Committee will present the candidate with a research problem related to his/har general research interests. The student nomally will be given two weeks to prepare and present to the Qualifying Examination Comittee a well-documented rationale for its solution. His/her performance will be judged on the basis of clarity of thought and presentation, approperiate reference to relevant literature, satisfactory oollection,
analysis and presentation of data and depth of understanding portrayed. Attention will be paid to the appropriateness of the methodology and the consistency of the conclusions.

A student who fails the field problem may retake it once, after one semester lapee.

## There will be four examinations.

Part One: One examination paper will be devoted to the candidate's field of specialization and will be designed to permit the student to explore extensively the chosen area of research.

Part Two: The other three examination papers will be based upon three areas chosen by the Qualifying Examination Comittee in consultation with the candidate.

Decision of the Examining Committee is by simple majority.

A atudent who fails in one or more examination may rewrite each failed examination once. Normally any rewriting of falled examinations will be completed within one semester following the initial examination.

## (b) Oral

From: The ocal will be held by the Qualifying Examination Comittoe at the successful conclusion of all written examinations. The student will be excamined primarily in the areas of the topics covered by the written examination, but questions may range over the entire discipline.

> Upon the successful conclusion of all written examinations an oral examination will be held by the Qualifying Examination Committee. The student will be oxamined primarily in the areas covered by the written examinations, but questions may range over the ontire discipline. A student who fails the oral examination may retake the oral examination once.

## DISSERTMNTAN

Excm: The candidate will prepare a dissertation proposal which will be circulated to faculty and resident graduate students and will present this proposal for discursion at a Department colloquium.
The coupleted dissertation will be fudged by the candidate's. Examining Comoittee. If the dissertation defence is failed, the candidate is ineligible for further candidacy in the degree program at this University. For further infomation and regulations, refer to General Regulations.
