HONORS PROGRAM Changein Requirements:
FROM: An honors program is offered for students interested in advanced work in Philosophy. It is strongly advised for students who plan to pursue a post-graduate degree in the subject.

Students proposing to enter the Honors Program in Philosophy must first complete 60 hours of University course work including 12 hours of Philosophy and fulfill the lower division requirements listed in the section 'Requirements for Minor, Major and Honors'. A grade point average of 3.0 or higher for all Philosophy courses is required for acceptance and continuation in the program, but does not by itself guarantee either. Students proposing to enter the Honors Program must submit an application (a form is available in the department office) and consult the department's undergraduate advisor. After one semester of coursework in the honors program a candidate must, in consultation with the undergraduate advisor, devise a program of studies. Consideration of the application and proposed program of studies will be based on the Department's assessment of the student's potential for advanced work.

T0: An honors program is offered for students interested in advanced work in Philosophy. It is strongly advised for students who plan to pursue a post-graduate degree in the subject.

Students proposing to enter the Honors Program in Philosophy must first complete 60 hours of University course work including 12 hours of Philosophy and fulfill the lower division requirements listed in the section 'Requirements for Minor, Major and Honors'. A grade point average of 3.0 or higher for all Philosophy courses is normally expected for entrance and continuation in the program, but does not by itself guarantee cither. Students proposing to enter the Honors Program must submit an application (a form is available in the department office) and consult the Department's undergraduate advisor. After one semester of coursework
in the honors program a candidate must, in consultation with the mimmaraluate advisor, devise a program of studies. Consideration of the application and proposed program of studies will be based on the Department's assessment of the student's potential for advanced work.

## RATIONALE:

This brings our requirements into line with those of the UBC Philosophy Department. It will allow the description a little more discretion in admitting a student with a GPA slightly below 3.0, for example. A student in the honors program at UBC would be able to apply for admission into our program upon transferring to SFU even though his Philosophy GPA is not 3.0. Otherwise it would take too much time for the student to improve his GPA before applying. We would like to have the opportunity to admit such students if the circumstances warrant it.

## RATIONALE:

"recommended" indicates the normal prerequisite, which may be waived in the case of students who satisfy the department that they have the necessary background for the course. This will usually be students from other deaprtments who have a special interest in particular upper-level philosophy courses.

Specific courses are no longer deemed necessary since, in the past, students appear to have picked up sufficient background from several different courses and departments.

RATIONALE:
The instructors for this course have begun the practice of introducing all necessary background in logic during the first week or two of class and in conjunction with the discussion of specific cases where some knowledge of logic is necessary. It is no longer felt that this need be presupposed for entry into the course.
