RURAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

Rationale

The planning of rural settlement and land use is a neglected field in both the academic and the governmental worlds in Canada. The only planning school which emphasizes it is at Queen's University, and in practice what rural planning is done is usually carried out by people trained in the urban field. Yet, as exurban settlement and resource developments of increasing magnitude continue, it is an important field.

In the governmental context this is an opportune time to advance rural planning studies. The regional level of government, at which planning can sensibly be carried out, is now well established in British Columbia, and planning is one of its mandatory functions. At the provincial level several coordinative mechanisms have now been developed which make it possible to relate provincial plans and programs to rural area planning in ways that were scarcely possible before. In other words as far as the outside world is concerned the time is ripe for entry into the field of rural planning.

In the context of Simon Fraser University the time is also ripe. It is a logical addition to the Geography program, since it depends on and interacts with existing courses of study such as central place theory, terrain analysis, biogeography, transportation geography, human geography, the geography of primary activities and agricultural geography. It is also a logical extension of Regional Planning (Geog. 443) and a natural complement of the Geography of Resource Development (Geog. 421).

Lastly, the developments in government at both the provincial and the regional level which have been mentioned above make it likely that there will be an expansion of jobs in these fields which suitably trained graduates could properly fill.
