Course Outline:

- 1. The topic will vary, responding to interests of faculty and students.
- 2. Ordinarily, the general scheme would be:
 - (a) Several weeks' meetings devoted to the exposition of major scholarly aspects of the chosen topic (orientation) conducted through presentations by the faculty member in charge, as well as through group discussion.
 - (b) Some work on relevant bibliography, involving preparation of materials to be distributed by student members, and comment on the available sources and guides.
- 3. Topical reports based on individual student research, occupying most of the seminar's meetings after the first three or four weeks.
- 4. A concluding session featuring summing up of the seminar's work by the faculty member in charge.

Competence of Faculty:

Almost all of the present faculty of the department are at present actively involved in research, and frequently in teaching, concerning Canadian problems.

Library Resources:

The holdings of the S.F.U. Library, supplemented by those at U.B.C., Vancouver Public Library, University of Washington (Seattle), and certain other smaller collections, if not fully sufficient are helpful.
