3. JUSTIFICATION

There is not a similar course offered on campus, or elsewhere in Western Canada. Some aspects of quantitative cartography might be taught in Quantitative Geography (807-3), but the overlapping does not go beyond one contact hour.

B. What is the range of topics that may be dealt with in the course?

Computer mapping, coding, transformation, projection, correspondence, interaction, quantitative surface analysis and interpretation, interpolation, theoretical surfaces, picture processing and computer graphics.

C. How does this course fit the goals of the department?

This course is an addition to both areas of techniques in Geography, and theoretical geography.
