Calendar Changes

DEPARTMENT OF MODERN LANGUAGES

At its meeting of October 14th, 1971, the Faculty of Arts Curriculum Committee approved the 1972-73 Undergraduate Calendar Submission for the Department of Modern Languages.

The justification for the changes as submitted by the Department of Modern Languages is outlined below.

Policy Change - Re-numbering of Upper-Level French Literature Courses

The present calendar lists courses at the 400 level without any order, either chronological or of genre or of difficulty. In the new numbering:

- digit 30 indicates French-Canadian literature
- digit 60 indicates century courses: 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th
- digit 70 indicates genre works: poetry, novel, theatre
- digit 80 indicates seminars
- digit 90 indicates more advanced and specialized work

No description is given since titles are self-explanatory. Instructors draw up specific syllabus each time the course is offered, one semester in advance, reading list, course description, etc.

A study of selected works representative of the last fifty years. (2-1-0)

FRENCH 140-3 French Civilization

The sociocultural background of French. The relationship between language and culture in France and French-Canada. This course is a multi-facetted approach to French Studies presented in collaboration by members of the Faculty. Classes will be given in English. ~~_____~~

FRENCH 205-1 French Conversation

An intermediate conversation course aimed at the level of students taking French 201 or 202. (0-1-0)
Prerequisite: French 152 or French 103 (or permission of the course chairman).

FRENCH 422-3 Canadian French

Continuation of French 421-3 with special emphasis on the dialects of Canadian French. (0-3-0)
Prerequisite: French 301-3 and Linguistics 221-3 (same prerequisites as for the whole 400-level series in French linguistics). French 421-3 highly recommended.

FRENCH 463-4 Literature of the Seventeenth Century

Students who hold credit for 441-4 cannot take this course for further credit. (2-2-0)
Prerequisite: Either French 230-3 or 240-3, and 241-3.

FRENCH 465-4 Literature of the Eighteenth Century

Students who hold credit for 448-4 cannot take this course for further credit. (2-2-0)
Prerequisite: Either French 230-3 or 240-3, and 241-3.

FRENCH 467-4 Romanticism

Students who hold credit for 442-4 cannot take this course for further credit. (2-2-0)
Prerequisite: Either French 230-3 or 240-3, and 241-3.

FRENCH 470-3 Realism to Naturalism

Topic of a comprehensive nature to be approved by the Course Chairman.

Students who hold credit for French 449-3 cannot take this course for further credit.

Students who wish to study beyond the 100 level are advised to enrol in French 151-4 and/or French 152-4 provided they have the necessary qualifications. A B+ grade in 103-4 or 151-4 (or special permission of the course chairman) will permit students to enrol in 152-4 and 201-3 concurrently.

Students who have had no French at all must register in French 102-4 in Group I, specially designed for them. All others who have had French previously, with or without formal school or university work (other than at SFU) and irrespective of the length of time elapsed since they last used, experienced or studied French, may be asked to take a placement test upon the decision of the course chairman, this placement test being given during the first week of classes. This placement test is designed to achieve a grouping by ability whereby the student may expect the maximum benefit from the audio-lingual approach. Moreover, in view of the policy relating to course challenge credits, it is to the student's advantage to do his best in this test.

- p. 136, French 102-4, replace note in italics by:

For students with some secondary-school French below the level of Grade 12. May not be taken by students who have completed French 100-3.

- p. 136, French 103-4, replace prerequisite and note by:

May not be taken by students who have completed French 101-3, 150-3, or 151-4.

Prerequisite: French 102-4.

- p. 137, French 151-4, replace prerequisite by:

For students with Grade 12 French or higher requiring an oral practices course. May not be taken by students who have completed French 101-3, 102-4, 103-4 or 150-3.

Lower Level

This will serve to introduce the student to French-Canadian thought through literature and the arts. The course will be conducted in French. (1-2-0)

240-3 Introduction to Modern French Literature

This will serve to introduce the student to French contemporary thought through literature. The course will be conducted in French; the object is to acquire a rapid reading facility and a critical appreciation of modern French literature. (1-2-0)

241-3 Introduction to the Masterpieces of French Literature

Continues the work of French 240 or 230. It will include study of works from the classical period to the twentieth century. (1-2-0)

III JUSTIFICATION

French 140 will complement the purely language-oriented courses offered at the 100-200 levels in the French program. It will serve as general background to anyone interested in the different aspects of French studies and hopefully arouse interest in French studies before or while the language skills are acquired. The course is to consist of a series of modules, each module being taught by a different lecturer. ,,

- B. What is the range of topics that may be dealt with in the course?

It will provide an overall view of the cultural scene of France and French Canada with particular emphasis on the relations between language and culture.

C. How does this course fit the goals of the department?

It will create a bridge between the oral-aural language courses and the literature courses.

D. How does this course affect degree requirements?

No changes: it will be an elective course. This course is to be a non-specialist course open to all students and does not constitute a part of the DML degree requirements.

An intermediate conversation course aimed at the level of students taking French 201 or 202.

Credit Hours: 1 Vector Description: (0-1-0)

Prerequisite(s): French 152 or French 103 (or permission of the course chairman)

Estimated Enrolment: 40

Semester Offered (e.g. yearly, every Spring; twice yearly, Fall and Spring):

Twice a year.

When course will first be offered: Fall 1972

III JUSTIFICATION

- A. What is the detailed description of the course including differentiation from lower-level courses, from similar courses in the same department and from courses in other departments in the University?

This course would accompany French 201 and 202 (which are our first reading and writing courses) and provide one hour a week for conversation practice (directed conversation and discussion). The class would be small and conducted by a Native Speaker. This course will prepare the student for French 300-3 "Advanced French Conversation".

- B. What is the range of topics that may be dealt with in the course?

We would use the following textbook - "Conversation in French" (Bonnal and Sedwick - American Book Co.) which is based on pictures.

- C. How does this course fit the goals of the department?

It would meet the needs of many students and help to keep up their interest. Therefore, we would have fewer course drop-outs.

- D. How does this course affect degree requirements?

It would not be required for any of the higher courses.

Continuation of French 421-3 with special emphasis on the dialects of Canadian French.

Credit Hours: 3 Vector Description: (0-3-0)

Prerequisite(s): French 301-3 and Linguistics 221-3 (same prerequisites as for the whole 400-level series in French linguistics). French 421-3 highly recommended.

Yearly.

When course will first be offered: Fall 1972

III JUSTIFICATION

- A. What is the detailed description of the course including differentiation from lower-level courses, from similar courses in the same department and from courses in other departments in the University?

Dialectology and language varieties represent an important field of French studies. Such a course would allow the student to become more familiar with viable alternatives as standards of spoken French. Furthermore, students are particularly interested in problems dealing with Canadian French. The subject matter of Canadian French is sufficiently diverse and student interest is so keen and topical that a separate course from French 421 is required.

- B. What is the range of topics that may be dealt with in the course?

Characterization of standard Canadian French (phonology, morphology, syntax, vocabulary) and local varieties thereof. French 422 will also be concerned with problems of bilingualism and biculturalism.

C. How does this course fit the goals of the department?

The purpose of this course is to give the student a broader knowledge of French. Indeed, the ultimate aim of the Department is to produce students who are not only well trained in Linguistics and fluent in French, but who have the ability to use and apply their knowledge in a Canadian context.

D. How does this course affect degree requirements?

Will simply count towards the 30/50 upper-level credit hours for the B.A. degree.

E. What are the calendar changes necessary to reflect the addition of this course?

None.

F. What course, if any, is being dropped from the calendar if this course is approved?

None.

G. What is the nature of student demand for this course?

Strong demand from students because, besides their knowledge of standard French, they are interested also in varieties of French in Canada (see A and C). They require more courses with Canadian content.

H. Other reasons for introducing the course.

In the current social context of Canada, the course is deemed to be important and relevant. Indeed, with the development of Canada as a distinctive nation, with her own culture, it is normal that her two languages have acquired distinctive Canadian features. Canadian French has its own characteristics with proper grammatical, phonological and lexical traits (there are several dictionaries of Canadian French). Moreover Canadian-French has its own 'dialectology'. (The French of Montreal is different from the French of Quebec City.) Students are not content anymore with copying the models of France and of what we call 'Parisian French'; they want to be able to communicate with French Canadians.
