The proposed courses in Kinesiology - 100-3 and 043-3 - were considered by the Interdisciplinary Committee on Kinesiology at its meeting of Thursday, November 13th.

The Kinesiology 100-3 course was approved by the Committee on the understanding that the formal course proposal form be completed for Senate approval. This has now been done and is attached herewith.

A further meeting of the Interdisciplinary Committee on Kinesiology has been scheduled for Thursday, November 20th and the more detailed outline of Kines. 043-3 will be considered at this time. Nevertheless, since the Committee has already considered this course and wishes it to be incorporated in the 1970-71 calendar, the papers are forwarded to you to meet the deadline for inclusion on the agenda for December's Senate Meeting.

The Senate Agenda Committee recommended that Kinesology 100-3 be placed before Senate at its December meeting, and that Kinesiology 043-3 not be placed before Senate until a more detailed outline of the course has been submitted.

8 8 8 JUSTIFICATION

A. The study of Kinesiology requires the integration of material from a number of disciplines. Most lawer level courses are taught by "pure scientists" who have little regard for the relevance of their material to Kinesiology. This course will create an appropriate conceptual matrix for the study of humon movement,

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- B; Faculty presenting upper level Kinesiology courses are unanimous in stating the need for such a course: The first lectures of their courses are invariably spant in the introduction of very elementary and very basic material which should be introduced in the early semasters.
- C. An orientation to the research which characterizes Kinesiology will make students appreciative of the undergraduate science courses and permit them to prepare for their discipline with reason and purpose.
 - D. The course will allow the student to confirm his identification with Kinesiology at an early stage.
