Course Number: P. D. S. 303-3

Course Title: Human Growth and Physical Development

Course Credit: 3 semester hours (2 hours lecture (2-1-3)
1 hour tutorial
3 hours laboratory)

Prerequisite: P. D. S. 306 (Human Anatomy) or permission of instructor.

Course Description: The processes, stages and characteristics of normal human physical development, and the genetic and environmental variations in human motor behavior.

Course Title: Human Anatomy

Course Credit: 4 semester hours (2 hours lecture (2-0-5)
5 hours laboratory)

Prerequisite: Bio. 316

Course Description: Systemic and regional human anatomy including the dissection of primates.

Course Title: Functional Anatomy

Course Credit: 3 semester hours (2 hours lecture (2-0-3)
3 hours laboratory)

Prerequisites: P. D. S. 306

Course Description: The dynamics of anatomy. Topics include arthrology, neuromuscular integration, functional adaptation, and common anomalies.

Course Number: P. D. S. 320-3

Course Title: Cultural Aspects of Motor Performance

Course Credit: 3 semester hours (2 hours lecture (2-1-0)
1 hour tutorial)

Prerequisite: Fifth semester status or permission of instructor.

Course Description: An analysis of the cultural aspects of physical activities with reference to salient political, social and economic factors in past and present societies.

Course Number: P. D. S. 401-4

Course Title: Mechanics of Human Movement

Course Credit: 4 semester hours (2 hours lecture (2-1-4)
1 hour tutorial
4 hours laboratory)

Prerequisite: P. D. S. 316

Course Description: The characteristics both unique and common, involved in varied human movements; the principles involved in performance of human motor skills, and the methods and techniques of mechanical and functional analyses of human motor performance.

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Course Number: P. D. S. 405-3

Course Title: Physiology of Motor Activity

Course Credit: 3 semester hours (2 hours lecture (2-1-3)
1 hour tutorial
3 hours laboratory)

Prerequisites: Bio. 305 (Animal Physiology), P. D. S. 306
(Human Anatomy).

Course Description: The role of physiological functions in physical performance; the immediate reciprocal effects of physical performance on physiological functions; and the extent and meaning of long-term functional changes occurring as a result of physical performance.

Course Number: P. D. S. 420-3

Course Title: Seminar - Kinesiology

Course Credit: 3 semester hours (1 hour lecture (1-2-2)
2 hours tutorial
2 hours laboratory)

Prerequisites: Psy. 380, P. D. S. 401, P. D. S. 320.

Course Description: Seminar treatment of selected biological, sociological and psychological principles of man as they relate to his motor behavior covered more generally on lower division courses. In addition to intensive reading and discussion, students will ordinarily be expected to undertake individual projects under supervision.

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4. The Committee makes the following administrative proposals:

(a) That the Department of Physical Development Studies be charged with the day-by-day administrative details such as:

- student advising
- maintenance of records
- correspondence
- other matters which normally arise in the operation of a departmental major program.

(b) That those administrative details requiring cooperative actions on the part of separate departments be initiated by the Head of the P. D. S. Department and that, in the event that cooperative agreement cannot be reached, the department heads concerned would have recourse through the committee. The details which might feasibly require some cooperative agreement would include:

- staff appointments and assignments
- budgeting and expenditures
- facility needs and assignments
- timetabling

(c) That the Interdisciplinary Committee on Kinesiology be responsible for those administrative details which might normally be handled by a Faculty. These would include such matters as recommendations to Senate and other appropriate bodies concerning the operation of the Kinesiology Program. Specifically the committee should be responsible for:

- 1) Recommending to Senate where necessary on matters of Curriculum including courses and course revisions.
- 2) Recommending to Senate on budgetary requirements for curriculum, facilities and for staff for the continuing operation of the program.

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- 3) Recommending to Senate those students, who having satisfactorily completed degree requirements should receive a degree.
- 4) Recommending to Senate on matters similar to the above as they may pertain to graduate programs in Kinesiology.
- 5) For the honors program the student will be required to have a "B" average in his lower division work and will have to be approved by the Committee.
- 6) Recommendations regarding transfer of students above the fifth semester will have to be made through this Committee.
