To: Sharon Yandle, Sonator:

The Graduate Student Association requests that the Senate most as soon as possible to discuss the space shortage in the university, particularly with respect to Teaching Assistants. Many of the T.A.'s roturned to Simon Fraser at the beginning of the semester to find that their offices had been appropriated for other purposes, i.e., tutorials and faculty offices. These offices had been used for counselling students, for teaching preparations, and for research; presently the T.A.'s have no place to continue these activities which are obviously a necessary and integral part of their teaching duties and scholarly pursuits, and thereby of the functioning of the university. We are presently carrying out these duties in cafeterias, lounge areas, faculty offices (which are boing shared with up to five other persons) or in crowded, often unavailable, cubiclos in the library. The hardships which the situation imposes on the Teaching Assistants is only equalled by that imposed on the students and faculty.

Since the Teaching Assistants are responsible for over 80% of the tutorials and most of the labs, grading and counselling, present spatial shortages can only adversely affect the academic standards of the entire university.

Enclosed is a letter dated September 13 which was sent to President McTaggart-Cowan, along with his reply to that letter. Not only did we receive merely token satisfaction from the latter, but also the rumoured acquisition of four trailers, which might have ameliorated the situation, has proved abortive, as have other attempts and sug-

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gested alternatives. Conferences with Mr. DeVries indicate that there are no solutions in sight. We are grievously concerned with the apparent complacency of the Board of Covernors and the provincial government in the face of what we consider to be a sericus problem.

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No feel that the minimum requirements which would enable us to carry out our work officiently are: 1) a desk and chair, 2) a filing cabinet and bookshelves, and 3) an enclosed area of some sort where a modicum of privacy could be maintained for counselling students.

As an intorim solution we suggest that SFU acquire a sufficient number of trailers to accommodate the Teaching Assistants. In the long-term view, we strongly urge that Phase III of the building program commence immediately. We should also point out that the shortage of office space for Teaching Assistants is merely one of the first manifestations of a much larger space problem which concorns all members of the academic community. Overcrowding in the library and lack of research space for members of the Science Faculty already present serious obstacles to scholarship.

We urge the Sonate to meet as soon as possible, to treat the situation with the concern it calls for, and to take whatever immediate steps are necessary to alleviate the present very unsatisfactory conditions.

Doar Mr. Prosident,

A mosting of the Graduate Student Association Executive was hold today to discuss the problem of the lack of space in the university. The departmental representatives reported that ever 250 teaching assistants are without adequate office space to carry on their teaching and councelling duties. This situation does not only affect teaching assistants but the entire faculty and student population and therefore may adversely affect the quality of instruction in the university.

The executive realizes that the space problem is closely bound up with the faulty long-term planning of the university. Here generally, the question is related to the provincial government's restrictive attitude toward higher education in British Columbia. This association realizes that despite these long-term considerations the university faces a serious short-term problem which has to be solved immediately.

The rumoured plan to increase the number of trailers by four will obviously not provide an adequate colution. At most, these trailers can accommodate twenty-eight small effices or if the tutorial rooms on the fifth floor C the Academic Quadrangle are released as teaching assistant offices then approximately twenty T.A.s will have to share one small area. The T.A.s believe that a pravate area is essential for proper counselling and teaching proparation.

We deplore the fact that neither the Graduate Student Association nor teaching assistants have been consulted by the administration on this problem and we urge in the interests of the academic community as a whole that in future steps be taken to involve the Graduate Student Association in university problems. We would appreciate the co-operation of the university administration in the solution of the problem. Failing this, the Graduate Student Association intends to take direct action.
