Proposal to Change MEd Degree Unit Requirements

Current Faculty of Education MEd Degree Requirements

The MEd is a professional degree signifying advanced knowledge about and advanced training in educational practice. Minimal requirements for MEd course work/comprehensive exam programs are the completion of 31 units in required and elective courses, plus a final comprehensive examination (five units). The content of EDUC 883 MEd Comprehensive Examination varies by program.

Proposed Faculty of Education MEd Degree Requirements

TO: The MEd is a professional degree signifying advanced knowledge about and advanced training in educational practice. Minimal requirements for MEd course work/comprehensive exam programs are the completion of minimum 30 units in required and elective courses, plus a final comprehensive examination (five units). The content of EDUC 883 MEd Comprehensive Examination varies by program.

Rationale

The change proposed here are for both curricular-pedagogical and financial reasons. The change relieves the two-course bottleneck in the first summer that has in the past created all sorts of scheduling, teaching and learning problems; as well, it is also cost-saving for our Faculty. The decision as to how many units a program uses is up to the faculty team that designs and operates each particular MEd program. The decision has to be ratified by the Director and GPC and should come to the Faculty meeting for information.
