RE: Training of Speech Thorapists and Clinical Psychologists

On behalf of the Associated Founds of Health of British Columbia, I would bring to the attention of the Search two resolutions which were passed at our Annual Moeting in October 1965. Those resolutions have already been brought to the attention of the Honourable Eric Martin, Minister of Health Services and Hospital Insurance and to the attention of the Monourable Leslie Peterson, Minister of Education.

The resolutions read as follows:

## SEECH THERAPY

WHEREAS speech therapy services are almost unavailable throughout British Columbia, and

WHEREAS speech therapists are urgently required to fill a very important gap in our total Mental Health program, and

WHEREAS this shortage is due to British Columbia's dependence on graduates of Eastern Canadian Universities and of Universities in the United States of America and the British Commonwealth,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Association of Union Boards of Health of British Columbia urge the Frovince of British Columbia and the Universities of British Columbia to immediately establish facilities for the training of Speech Therapists.

## CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGISTS

WHEREAS no graduate program for the training of clinical psychologists now - exists in British Columbia, and

WIFREAS only two of the four established regional Montal Health Clinics have the essential help of a clinical psychologist, and

WHEREAS present salary schedules are failing to attract psychologists to British Columbia.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Association of Union Boards of Health urge the Provincial Government to reclassify the position of psychologist in the Civil Service Pay Schedule to attract psychologists and, further, that we urge the Province of British Columbia to support a graduate training program at one of the British Columbia Universities so that clinical psychologists may be completely trained in British Columbia.

The Associated Boards of Health of British Columbia represents all the Boards of Health in the Province and is composed of a group of men and women vitally interested in the progress of public health. They feel that the present shortage of trained workers in the above two categories is a great detriment and hope that one or other of the Universities may be able, in due course, to establish training courses in those specialties.

These resolutions are also being brought to the attention of the Senates of the University of British Columbia and the University of Victoria.
