Subj	ect: Update on Impact of New Scheduling Policy		

(effective Fall 2009) Date: April 19, 2011

Further to the November 10, 2009 memo, attached are three attachments that show the following:

- 1. Scheduling patterns of undergraduate primary class sections (Burnaby, Surrey and Vancouver campuses) in Fall 2010 compared to Fall 2009 (including Fall 2008 in Attachment 1), and
- 2. Percent usage of centrally scheduled classrooms (Burnaby only), in Fall 2010 compared to Fall 2008 and Fall 2009.

Highlights include:

- With respect to scheduling of all primary class sections (see Attachment 1):
 - In Fall 2010, the busiest period was between 9:30 am 11:30 am on Mondays to Fridays and between 1:30 pm to 4:30 pm on Mondays to Thursdays. Compared to Fall 2009, there was a slight increase in the scheduling of sections overall because more sections were offered in Fall 2010. In particular, there was an increase on Tuesday and Thursday mornings between 8:30 am - 9:30 am. In Fall 2008, the busiest period was between 9:30 am - 11:30 am and 1:30 pm - 2:30 pm on Monday through to Thursday. Compared to Fall 2008, there was a decrease in scheduling sections during those times, and an increase on Tuesdays and Thursdays during 8:30 am -9:00 am and on Mondays and Wednesdays during 4:30pm - 5:00 pm (see Figs 1A to 1F).
 - Friday continues to be different from the other weekdays. In Fall 2010, there was a decrease in the scheduling of primary class sections on Friday mornings but a slight increase on Friday afternoons, compared to Fall 2009 (see Fig. 1D). Compared to Fall 2008, there was an increase in sections scheduled throughout the day (see Fig1E).
 - Compared to Fall 2009, the percentage of sections that are scheduled during prime time (10:30 am - 2:30 pm) in Fall 2010 has dropped on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. The percentage of sections scheduled after 4:30 pm also has increased on Mondays and Wednesdays (see Tables 1A to 1C and Fig. 1D)).
 - Compared to Fall 2008, the Wednesday peak between 10:30 am 11.30 am has leveled off in Fall 2010 (and Fall 2009) (see Fig. 2C).

- With respect to centrally scheduled classrooms (see Attachment 2):
 - Compared to Fall 2008 and Fall 2009, there was some leveling off in the use of centrally scheduled rooms within each week. In Fall 2008 and 2009, Wednesday continued to be the busiest day of the week but in Fall 2010, Tuesday was as busy as Wednesday (see Fig. 3 and Table 3).
 - Compared to Fall 2009, the percent usage of centrally scheduled classrooms has increased in Fall 2010 on Monday afternoons, and Tuesday mornings (see Figure 4A.1 to 4A.3).
 - The pattern of usage of centrally scheduled classrooms in Fall 2010 bears a higher resemblance to Fall 2009 than Fall 2008 overall. Compared to Fall 2008, the percent usage of these classrooms in Fall 2009 and Fall 2010: a) dropped between 12:20 pm 1:30 pm, and b) increased on Friday (see Fig 4A to 4E).
- With respect to scheduling of all primary class sections by Division and Faculty (see Attachment 3)
 - For all 100-level courses, the pattern in Fall 2010 has slightly evened out such that there were more sections scheduled on Monday and Wednesday afternoons compared to Fall 2009. However the busiest times were still on Tuesday and Thursday between 10:30 am – 12:30 pm and between 2:30 pm – 4:30 pm (see Fig 5A and 5B).
 - For all 200-level courses, the pattern in Fall 2010 was similar to Fall 2009 (see Figure 5C and 5D).
 - For Applied Sciences upper division sections, the pattern has changed from a concentration of sections offered on Monday, Wednesday and Friday in Fall 2009 to a more even pattern in Fall 2010 (see Figure 6A and 6B).
 - For Arts and Social Sciences upper division sections, the pattern in Fall 2010 was similar to Fall 2009. The busiest times were still on Monday between 10:30 am 11:30 am, and on Tuesday between 11:30 am 12:30 pm and between 1:30 pm 2:30 pm (see Figures 6C and 6D).
 - For Business upper division sections, some smoothing out have occurred in Fall 2010 compared to Fall 2009. In Fall 2010, Tuesday afternoon between 2:30 pm 4:30 pm, Wednesday morning between 10:30 am 11:30 am, afternoon between 2:30 pm 4:30 pm and evening between 6:30 pm 8:30 pm, and Thursday between 6:30 pm 7:30 pm were distinctly very busy times (see Figures 6E and 6F).
 - For Communication, Art and Technology upper division sections, some smoothing out have occurred in Fall 2010 compared to Fall 2009. However, there was an increased concentration of sections on Thursday between 10:30 am – 12:30 pm (see Fig 6G and 6H).
 - For Education upper division sections, more sections in Fall 2010 were offered in the morning but there was still a notable concentration of sections offered during 4:30 pm - 7:30 pm from Monday to Wednesday, probably to cater to students who work.

No class section is offered on Thursday between 8:30 am – 4:30 pm (see Fig 6I and 6J).

- For Environment upper division sections, the pattern in Fall 2010 has changed slightly in that there were more sections offered after 4:30 pm. However, as in Fall 2009, no section is offered on Wednesday from 10:30 am – 4:30 pm (see Fig 6K and 6L).
- For Health Science upper division sections, in Fall 2010, more timeslots were scheduled to accommodate the increase in the number of sections, compared to Fall 2009. The times between 9:30 am 11:30 am on Monday and between 2:30 pm 3:30 pm on Monday and Tuesday were the busiest times but there were only up to 4 sections that overlap (see Figures 6M and 6N).
- For Science upper division sections, there was a heavier concentration of sections scheduled on Monday in Fall 2010 compared to Fall 2009. Very few sections were scheduled on Thursday after 12:30 pm in both Fall 2009 and Fall 2010 (see Figures 60 and 6P).

Figures 1: Number of Undergraduate Primary Class Sections Scheduled by Half-Hour Time Slot




Fig. 1B: Fall 2009 (1154 sections total)





Fig. 1C: Fall 2008 (1193 sections total)




Fig. 1D: Difference (Fall 2010 - Fall 2009)





Fig. 1E: Difference (Fall 2010 - Fall 2008)



Undergraduate Primary Class Section Scheduling, Fall 2008, 2009 and 2010






Fig. 2D: Thursday --- Fall 2008 Fall 2009 Fall 2010 Prime time 08:30

The figure below shows the distribution of weekly instructional hours in centrally scheduled rooms by days of the week







Undergraduate Lower-Division Primary Class Sections Scheduled by Half-Hour Time Slot




Fig. 5C: Fall 2010, All 200-Level Courses (241 sections)




Fig. 5B: Fall 2009, All 100-Level Courses (294 sections)





Fig. 5D: Fall 2009, All 200-Level Courses (232 sections)

Undergraduate Upper-Division Primary Class Sections Scheduled by Faculty and Half-Hour Time Slot




Fig. 6C: Fall 2010, Arts & Social Sciences (273 sections)





Fig. 6B: Fall 2009, Applied Sciences (48 sections)







Fig. 6D: Fall 2009, Arts & Social Sciences (247 sections)






Fig. 6G: Fall 2010, Comm., Art & Tech. (83 sections)











Fig. 6H: Fall 2009, Comm., Art & Tech. (80 sections)




Fig. 6K: Fall 2010, Environment (26 sections)





Fig. 6J: Fall 2009, Education (23 sections)








Fig. 6L: Fall 2009, Environment (27 sections)




Fig. 60: Fall 2010, Science (103 sections)






Fig. 6N: Fall 2009, Health Sciences (17 sections)
