In working our way through these questions (and others), you will be introduced to philosophical inquiry, critical analysis, historical and cross-cultural tudies, and empirical research. Assignment will draw on and foster your reading and writing skills, as well as your ability to express ideas orally, by way of small and large group discussion, individual writing assignments, and collaborative inquiry.
