COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The focus in this course will be on the psychological principles underlying the instructional process. Three basic components will be discussed: how people learn, instructional procedures, intrapersonal and interpersonal influences.

Relevant research will be discussed in such areas as: learning theory, information processing, child development, instructional strategies, evaluation, classroom management, individual differences, personality, self-concept and motivation. Course participants will derive information from four sources: two, one hour lecture-discussion periods per week, a one hour weekly seminartutorial, textbook readings, and suggested related readings assigned by the instructor and/or the seminar leader.
