COURSE DESCRIPTION

OBJECTIVES

- 1. To encourage students to think seriously about the nature of education and schooling and to consider the relationship between education, schooling, and major social, political, and economic institutions in society.
- 2. To stimulate an interest in the future of education in Canada.

The emphasis in the course will be on (but not limited to) education in Canada. Education will be broadly conceived and discussion will not be limited to schools and schooling.
