DESCRIPTION

This course explores social issues through developing an understanding of social mechanisms that operate at individual, institutional and societal levels. It introduces you to the dynamic and varied connections between these issues, education in general, and educational practice. The objective of the course is to develop awareness needed to become reflective practitioners (and citizens) who can engage with these issues critically and thoughtfully. It will, we hope, become apparent that this awareness is a vital aspect of how we engage in and with educational practices and institutions professionally and personally. You will be encouraged, both in lecture and in tutorial, to participate in dialogue and reflection that promotes this understanding. Some of the topics we will be exploring are: social mechanisms such as authority, reproduction, resistance and recognition; identity at home, school and in the world; selected social issues and how they manifest in the classroom. This course is about opening up to new perspectives and ideas.
