EDUC 240-3 Social Issues in Education (D100)

DESCRIPTION

Based on the belief that learning is inherently a social and relational activity, this course will explore social relations in educational settings, and how they are shaped by social issues prevalent in wider contexts. A key objective of this course is to cultivate the ability to think critically about the social context in which people teach and learn. We will critically analyze the school's relationship to larger social challenges, explore equity and equality in educational contexts and examine the implications of social justice for teaching and learning. You will be encouraged, both in lecture and in tutorial, to participate in dialogue and reflection that promotes this understanding. Some of the key topics we will cover are how power and privilege operate, manifesting in social issues such as race, sexism, heteronormativity, disability, poverty, and corporate presence in the classroom.

Course Requirements:

Readings must be completed by the day of the lecture/tutorial (except for first day of class). You are expected to attend all lectures and tutorials.
