COURSE DESCRIPTION

Participants in this course will be able to:

- 1. Describe the nature of giftedness in terms of current conceptions and definitions.
- 2. Recognize behavioral characteristics of gifted students (intellectual, academic, creative, social and artistic).
- 3. Describe instruments and procedures necessary in the design of a process for selecting students for gifted programs.
- 4. Design learning experiences appropriate for highly able learners in the regular classroom or special programs which enhance thinking and learning skills within and across curriculum areas.
- 5. Discuss the rationale for modified learning activities and/or programs for gifted students.
