Education 431-4 Analysis of Educational Concepts

1. Course Description

The aim of this course is to examine and elucidate key educational concepts (such as 'education', 'knowledge', 'learning', 'teaching', 'indoctrination', etc.) that are fundamental to the understanding, evaluation and development of educational theories. The course also deals with the function of definitions, slogans, mataphors and models in educational arguments.

The course should be valuable not only to educators and prospective teachers but to every person who has a serious interest in the study of education.

- (b) A term paper of about 15 type-written, double-spaced pages is due one week before the last day of classes. Students are expected to select their own topics, but to have them approved by the instructor.
