Education 435-4 EDUCATIONAL THEORY AND THEORY CRITICISM

Course Description:

This course is designed for practising teachers who feel the need to reflect systematically on the theoretical foundations of contemporary educational practices and who at the same time wish to complete degree requirements.

It is a course in the social and philosophical perspectives of education and centers around an examination of the nature and purpose of education and the extent to which the modern school fulfills its function as an educational institution.

Among the specific topics to be dealt with are:

the point and purpose of education
conflicting social purposes of the school as an institution
assumptions underlying some alternative schooling proposals
'growth' and 'development' as educational models
the 'needs' doctrine in education
authority, discipline, and punishment
students' and teachers' rights
(moral) values education

Course Requirements:

Students are expected to attend two one hour lectures and participate in two hours of tutorial discussions weekly. (Details of time, location, and other arrangements will be announced later. At this point it is envisaged that the weekly lectures and tutorials will be conducted on Mondays between 4:00 - 8:00 p.m.)

Students' work will be evaluated on the basis of participation in tutorials, essay work, and possibly an examination.
