Students will learn how to develop and implement lessons to teach the sound system of English (phonology), the morphological systems of English (derivational and inflectional), the syntax of English (tenses and some basic clause structures), and the major discourse types in English (based on oral language registers and literary genres).
- 3. Students will learn how to adjust their teaching practices to fit the different needs and interests of children, adolescents, and adults.
