This course exposes students to three innovative approaches in TESL. It is assumed that students are already familiar with the standard linguistically-based approaches to TESL, such as the audio-lingual and the functional or notional approaches. The course looks at radically different approaches that are not based on the science of linquistics, but are derived rather from findings in the psychologically-oriented disciplines of counselling, psychotherapy and neurophysiology.

- 1. The linquistic basis of most methods.
- 2. The psychological bases of the innovative methods.
- 3. The Silent Way.
- 4. Counselling-Learning.
- 5. Suggestopedia.
- 6. The dangers of eclecticism.

ASSIGNMENTS:

- -Three videotapes illustrating each of the three approaches (done in collaboration with other students in the class (40% of the grade).
- -Three short commentaries on the videotapes and the principles of each new method, done individually (60% of the grade).
