COURSE DESCRIPTION

As a group, we will examine the complexities and responsibilities of teaching Social Studies at the elementary level. In addition each student will develop a comprehensive unit for a specific grade level and present lessons using engaging learning strategies.

- to develop a comprehensive unit, using a variety of engaging strategies and integrating other subjects in a meaningful way
- to develop and use criteria reference sets for assessment and evaluation
