DESCRIPTION

As a group, we will examine the complexities and responsibilities of teaching Social Studies at the elementary level. Weekly readings will be assigned to support and promote discussions leading to a better understanding of what Social Studies learning/teaching encompasses. In addition each student will develop a comprehensive unit for a specific grade level and present lessons using a variety of engaging learning strategies.

- to become knowledgeable about the BC Social Studies curriculum
- to look critically at the different resources used in Social Studies classes
- to work with critical challenges
- to collaboratively present a lesson
- to develop a comprehensive unit, using a variety of engaging strategies and integrating other subjects in a meaningful way
- to develop and use criteria reference sets for assessment and evaluation
- to share ideas and resources
