Course Description:

The course will provide a comprehensive introduction to law and the legal process. The basic divisions or components of the law will be examined, including: (1) civil law (e.g. torts, contracts, property); (2) criminal law and procedure; (3) constitutional law; (4) family law; (5) administrative law, and; (6) consumer law. Special emphasis will be placed on recent changes in the Canadian legal and constitutional system, especially as they pertain to major issues facing Canadian educators. The course will also offer a basic survey of legal history, legal research skills, and case law technique.
