COURSE DESCRIPTION

This introductory law course is designed to provide teachers and administrators with practical knowledge of Canadian law and the legal process. A broad range of legal topics and concepts will be covered. No prior legal knowledge or experience is required. The course begins with a brief look at the history of our legal system and its institutions (i.e. the court system). Legal ethics are examined in the process. In addition, other areas of the law that will be discussed include:

- criminal law (

- family law (divorce, custody, maintenance)
- the Young offender's Act
- contract law
- constitutional law and the Charter of Rights
- aboriginal rights
- environmental law
