#### COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course has been designed to introduce teachers to concepts and practices related to the nature and nurture of gifted potential in educational settings. Participants will meet a gifted student, as well as collecting knowledge and skills to meet the exceptional needs of these individuals.

### **OBJECTIVES:**

Participants in this course will be able to:

- 1. Design learning experiences appropriate for highly able learners in the regular classroom or special programs which enhance thinking and learning skills within and across curriculum areas.
- 2. Recognize behavioral characteristics of gifted students (intellectual, academic, creative, social and artistic).
- 3. Describe instruments and procedures necessary in the design of a process for selecting students for gifted programs.
- 4. Describe the nature of giftedness in terms of current conceptions and definitions.
- 5. Discuss the rationale and historical foundations for services to gifted students.
- 6. Identify the needs of special needs groups within the gifted, i.e., underachievers, girls, etc.
