COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course provides an opportunity for classroom teachers to examine current literature and research on promoting thinking as an element of school learning. Participants will also investigate a variety of opportunities for and approaches to teaching thinking, and discuss how higher-order thinking can be infused into the daily life of the classroom. They will be expected to prepare thinking activities in selected curriculum areas, practice and demonstrate teacher-student interactions that promote thoughtful learning, and develop approaches to student assessment and evaluation.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Students will:

a.	Critique of a resource for teaching thinking15%
b.	Activity plans, including assessment strategies, for two teaching/learning experiences in selected curriculum areas
c.	One example of how to infuse critical thinking in a curriculum area using existing teaching resources such as texts or curricular materials15%
d.	Audiotape and analysis of two classroom learning experiences demonstrating teacher-student interactions
d.	Presentation of a critical challenge, including criteria for student assessment and evaluation
	Students will be evaluated on the above assignments (90%) and on thoughtful participation in class activities (10%).
