PREREOUISITE:

Education 401/2 or the equivalent of a first year practicum.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The course will provide a comprehensive introduction to law and the legal process, particularly as they relate to the Canadian educational setting. The course is designed to expose teachers, students and educational administrators to a number of fundamental legal concepts and requires absolutely no prior legal knowledge or experience with law-related education. The basic components of the law that will be discussed include:

- 1. Tort Law (e.g. negligence)
- 2. Contract Law
- 3. Family Law (e.g. divorce, custody, maintenance)
- 4. Criminal Law
- 5. Juvenile Law (e.g. Youth Court, Young Offenders Act)
- 6. Wills and Estates
- 7. Constitutional Law (e.g. The Charter of Rights and Freedoms)
- 8. Students' Rights (e.g school prayer, suspensions, discipline)

COURSE REOUIREMENTS:

Students will be evaluated on the basis of class participation (50%) and a 5-10 page research paper (50%).
