

GRADUATE CERTIFICATE IN CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTION (GCCI)

Faculty of Education

The Senate approved Graduate Certificate in Curriculum and Instruction (GCCI), builds on the SFU Faculty of Education's current graduate programs in Curriculum and Instruction (C&I). C&I programs – composed of a core of required courses and electives - are key Faculty of Education strategies to engage – locally, nationally and internationally - various learners, constituencies, and communities of educators. The design, customization and delivery of the specialty/theme-based MEd programs in C&I curriculum rely on tenure-track and limited term faculty as well as emeriti and adjunct faculty, who, collectively and collaboratively, bring much valued knowledge, professional perspectives and expertise to the programs.

Current graduate programs in C&I are designed to be academically rigorous, engaging and to provide direct benefit to both individual learners and various professional and learning communities. These programs of graduate study influence the quality of teaching and learning environments in myriad settings; enhance the thoughtfulness, professional repertoire, and competence of educators and instructional leaders in their various capacities and circumstances; and often serve as vehicles for informing educational policy at various organizational levels. The various settings and learning environments include public and private schools; provincial, national and international colleges, technical institutes, and teaching universities; and governmental and non-governmental organizations and agencies.

C&I is recognized as a sub-discipline within the broad field of educational studies. C&I draws from the philosophies of epistemology and ethics, psychologies of human development and learning; approaches to creative and critical thinking; and the theories and practices of program development, program evaluation, and curriculum design. Graduate studies in the Faculty of Education - within the general program/degree framework of C&I - offers specialty diploma programs and research and practice-based masters and doctoral programs. These programs are delivered in various settings/locations, use various organizational frameworks (e.g. cohorts) and utilize various instructional formats/designs (e.g. f2f, web-enabled, and hybrid).

Current MEd graduate programs – delivered under the program/department category of C&I and responsive to expressed and documented needs – include: Numeracy/Mathematics Education; Science Education; Creative, Collaborative and Collaborative Inquiry; Contemplative Inquiry; Diversity; Foundations; Teaching English as an Additional Language; French Language Education; Health and Active Living; Justice, Law, Ethics and Education; Post Secondary Curriculum Design and Delivery; Arts Education; and Environmental and Place-based Education. Each version of a MEd in C&I - based upon a generic version (program shell) - and each new iteration of a previously approved MEd C&I program requires Faculty Graduate Program Committee approval.

It is contemplated and proposed that each new specialized version/variant of the Graduate Certificate in Curriculum and Instruction (GCCI) will, like the MEd in C&I, be based upon or

mirror the generic GCCI approved by Senate, and be tailored/customized to reflect the learning needs and characteristics of identified learners, constituencies, or communities of practice (e.g. adult educators, Aboriginal Leaders, Community College department heads, language teachers, educational consultants). Like each the MEd program in C&I, the GCCI will consist of a set of core and specialty courses that will reflect the nature or flavor of the particular Certificate.

In the case of each GCCI, three courses will be drawn from the following courses required for the MEd in C&I:

- EDUC 816-5: Developing Educational Programs and Practices for Diverse Educational Settings
- EDUC 820-5: Current Issues in Curriculum and Pedagogy
- EDUC 822-5: Evaluation of Educational Programs
- EDUC 823-5: Curriculum and Instruction in an Individual Teaching Specialty
- EDUC 830-5: Implementation of Educational Programs
- EDUC 833-5: Social and Moral Philosophy in Education
- EDUC 858-5: Intercultural Perspectives and Practices in Francophone School Contexts

The fourth course (3 units of credit) will be an approved Special Topics course or current graduate level course thematically linked to curriculum and instruction.

Though grounded in scholarship and research, C&I courses are broadly and flexibly adaptable, both thematically and with respect to the individual instructional backgrounds of the practitioner-students. They are courses that can be updated from time to time by adjusting the reading lists and fine-tuning the assignments.

It is anticipated and proposed that the Faculty of Education will, based upon its priorities as set out in its planning documents and its enrollment goals, offer various versions of the Senate approved GCCI based upon identified, documented, and particular needs. These needs may, among other things, reflect current educational trends, shifting interests in the field, the needs of educational interest groups, or changes within institutions regarding required credentials. Each version of the GCCI - because it is based upon the course/program structure of the MEd in C&I - will, as set out in GGR 1.7.6, provide the opportunity to "ladder" toward an eventual MEd in C&I.

The essential differences between versions of the GCCI will be the nature of the populations being served, the particular three course combination of C&I courses being taught, the nature of the approved three unit Special Topics Course, and the means of program delivery/teaching methods. It is contemplated/expected that each version of the GCCI will be cohort-based.

In the specific instance of the GCCI: Teaching Greek as an Additional Language, being proposed for September 2014, the three courses drawn from C&I will be:

• EDUC 816-5: Developing Educational Programs and Practices for Diverse Educational Settings

- EDUC 820-5: Current Issues in Curriculum and Pedagogy
- EDUC 823-5: Curriculum and Instruction in an Individual Teaching Specialty

The fourth course will be EDUC 714-3: Curriculum and Instruction of Greek: Transformative Learning Designs for a Greek Language Pedagogy. This is a thematically related special topics course, approved by the Faculty Graduate Programs Committee, that focuses on purposeful curricular design and effective instructional practices for teaching Greek as an Additional Language.

In the specific instance of the GCCI: Teaching Greek as an Additional Language, the program will be cohort-based, and all courses will be delivered online.

Each new or future version of the GCCI will require the approval of the Faculty Graduate Programs Committee, the approval of the Faculty Council, and review by Senate Graduate Studies Committee.

It is requested/recommended that positive consideration be given to providing the Senate approved Graduate Certificate in Curriculum and Instruction (GCCI) in the form and manner, and following the procedures, set out above.

Proposal for a Graduate Certificate in Curriculum and Instruction Faculty of Education Simon Fraser University

1. CREDENTIAL TO BE AWARDED Graduate Certificate in Curriculum and Instruction (GCCI)

2. LOCATION OF PROGRAM

The program may be offered at any site in British Columbia where there is a demand and suitable classroom space is available. For cohorts from the lower mainland, the program will be offered at one of SFU's campuses.

- 3. FACULTY OFFERING THE PROGRAM Faculty of Education
- 4. ANTICIPATED START DATE September, 2013

5. DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM

Summary

The proposed graduate certificate builds on SFU's expertise in curriculum and instruction, and existing graduate programs in that field. Professional competence in curriculum and instruction can enhance the quality of teaching provided by instructors in public and private schools, community colleges, technical institutes, and universities. Instructors in these settings can benefit from graduate study of research, theory, practice and professional ethics in the area of curriculum and instruction. The proposed certificate will consist of four courses (18 units) administered through Graduate Programs in the Faculty of Education.

Background

Curriculum and instruction is recognized as a sub-discipline within the broad field of educational studies. The study of curriculum and instruction draws from the philosophies of epistemology and ethics, psychologies of human development and learning, approaches to creative and critical thinking, and the theories and practices of program development, program evaluation, and curriculum design. Curriculum and instruction is often taught through a critical examination of current instructional practices.

SFU's Faculty of Education offers Master's and Doctoral programs in curriculum and instruction including a specialty Master of Education (MEd) program. SFU's MEd specialty program in curriculum and instruction currently includes cohorts taught on-campus at Surrey and off-campus in Prince Rupert and Victoria. Locating the MEd program according to the needs of students and their organizations is a key strategy for engaging with communities of educators across British Columbia. Delivery of the specialty MEd in curriculum and instruction relies on tenure-track members of the Faculty of Education as well as Lecturers, Professors Emeriti and Adjunct Professors. The Adjunct Professors and Lecturers who teach in curriculum and instruction are experienced instructors who bring valued professional perspectives and expertise to the programs.

Through contacts with educational institutions across the province a need has been identified for a graduate certificate in curriculum and instruction that would enable educators to advance their careers without committing to the six semesters or more required to complete the MEd.

Purpose of the Graduate Certificate

The purpose of the GCCI is to provide professional development to K-12 teachers and instructors in postsecondary education. The certificate is expected to be recognized by educational institutions as a professional development credential at the graduate level.

Enhanced educational access for economically important groups. The certificate is designed to provide access to professional development for those working as instructors (a) in the trades, technologies and health related fields at BC public colleges, and (b) in educational institutions serving the First Nations and indigenous peoples of BC. Completion of the GCCI will increase the career advancement opportunities for these postsecondary sector employees. Many of those who would benefit from the program have CGPAs below 3.0 and without access to a graduate certificate would not normally be accepted into graduate studies at SFU.

<u>Increased value to the community.</u> Technical colleges and similar postsecondary institutions have an important role to play in training British Columbians for work in the trades, technology, and health sectors. SFU can assist these institutions to raise the quality of their educational services by offering an academically sound, professionally-oriented graduate certificate in curriculum and instruction. The connections that SFU develops with postsecondary instructors who complete the certificate will enhance the cooperative relationships that the University already enjoys with postsecondary institutions across the province.

Requirements for Graduation

The minimum University requirements for admission to a graduate certificate program are set out in GGR 1.3.2a.

The GCCI will be comprised of four Faculty of Education graduate courses. Three will be chosen from the following courses required for the MEd in Curriculum and Instruction.

- EDUC 816-5: Developing Educational Programs and Practices for Diverse Educational Settings
- EDUC 820-5: Current Issues in Curriculum and Pedagogy
- EDUC 822-5: Evaluation of Educational Programs
- EDUC 823-5: Curriculum and Instruction in an Individual Teaching Specialty

- EDUC 830-5: Implementation of Educational Programs
- EDUC 833-5: Social and Moral Philosophy in Education
- EDUC 858-5: Intercultural Perspectives and Practices in Francophone School Contexts

The fourth course will be an approved special topics course thematically linked to curriculum and instruction:

• EDUC 714-3: Scholarship in Curriculum and Instruction

EDUC 714-3 will introduce students to the academic standards and expected practices in a graduate program and will do so through examination of concepts and issues in curriculum and instruction. In the course, students will advance their understanding of academic modes of spoken and written discourse and will enhance their ability to think critically, argue persuasively, and express their ideas in standard scholarly formats.

Teaching methods and estimated completion time

The courses in the program are primarily taught through weekly face-to-face meetings. The courses are designed to allow for students to participate in discussion and to receive feedback on written assignments. There is no designated work term or placement because it is anticipated that most students will be working full-time in education-related employment. Students will be able to complete the certificate in three semesters of continuous enrollment.

Enrollment plan and fees

The certificate will be organized as a cost-recovery, cohort program such that courses will only be offered when a sufficient number of students have been identified to form a cohort. The recommended fee for 2013/14 is \$538 per unit, which is the per-unit equivalent of the fee to be charged for the MEd in curriculum and instruction in 2013/14.

Resources needed to implement the program

- Access to bibliographic databases provided by the SFU library
- Classroom space
- Access to an SFU-supported learning management system

Faculty

Courses will be mostly taught by instructors holding a Doctorate in Education or a related field. On occasion, a course may be taught by an instructor holding a Master's degree who is enrolled in a doctoral program in Education or a related field.

Proposal for a Specific Version of the Online Graduate Certificate in Curriculum and Instruction (GCCI) in *Teaching Greek as an Additional Language*

Credential to Be Awarded

Graduate Certificate in Curriculum and Instruction (GCCI) in Teaching Greek as an Additional Language

Rationale

The purpose of the GCCI in Teaching Greek as an Additional Language is to provide professional development for bachelor's-degree-qualified current and future teachers of Modern Greek as a heritage language, in response to a rising demand for fully qualified teachers of Greek both in Metro Vancouver and in other Greek language communities in Canada, the United States, and China. The certificate is expected to be recognized by educational institutions as a professional development credential at the graduate level, which can, optionally, "ladder" into a Master of Education Degree.

This GCCI is designed to provide access to professional development in curriculum and instruction for a) language teachers within the educational system (primary and secondary), so that they improve their existing skills in teaching Modern Greek in public and private schools in Canada, USA, and China; b) for more advanced learners of Greek who may wish to become language instructors capable of using appropriate pedagogical tools in teaching Greek as an additional language. The creation of this GCCI would activate a partnership between the Faculty of Education and the Stavros Niarchos Foundation (SNF) Centre for Hellenic Studies at SFU. As such, it would provide avenues toward an interdisciplinary collaboration at SFU and an engagement with other educational communities with whom the SNF Centre for Hellenic Studies currently collaborates.

With the support of the Greek Ministry of Education, the SNF Centre for Hellenic Studies collaborates with universities in China (Nankai University), USA (University of Washington, Northwestern University, State University of California, and CUNY), Greece (University of Athens, University of Patras), and Canada (York University, University of Alberta, University of Toronto).

The Faculty of Education at SFU proposes to collaborate with the SNF Centre for Hellenic studies to assist them with their efforts to enhance their heritage language learning communities by offering an academically sound graduate program in curriculum and instruction, which will focus on epistemology and ethics, human development and learning, creative and critical thinking, theories and practices of program development, curriculum design, and critical examination of current and proposed instructional practices.

A Market Analysis

The creation of this version of the on-line GCCI involves a close collaboration between the SFU Faculty of Education, the SNF Centre for Hellenic Studies, and Greek language programs at collaborating universities, while addressing a scarcity of teachers of Greek in both local and international communities. While the program would provide for the educational needs of a "niche market" of multilingual learners, it would also create the potential for the Faculty of Education to configure future offerings of three of their masters-level curriculum and instruction courses in on-line versions.

This GCCI in *Teaching Greek as an Additional Language* would meet an international demand and would encourage participation by international students in Faculty of Education graduate certificate programs. In addition, it would provide an avenue toward a variety of collaborations with other universities in Canada, USA, and China, since the SNF Centre for Hellenic Studies participates in a collaborative network with Universities in China (Nankai University), USA (University of Washington, Northwestern University, State University of California, and CUNY), Greece (University of Athens, University of Patras) and Canada (York University, University of Alberta, University of Toronto).

Factors that indicate a robust student response to this proposed version of the on-line GCCI include the following:

- Significant support from the Greek Ministry of Education,
- Strong interest from collaborating Universities in the creation this GCCL and
- The expressed needs of schools and programs in multiple jurisdictions that lack sufficiently qualified Greek language instructors.

The SNF Centre for Hellenic Studies indicates that an initial cost-recovery cohort could be filled with interested individuals from Canada alone. A conservative estimate by the SNF Centre predicts that there will be sufficient interest among qualified applicants to provide for at least two iterations of The Greek Language GCCI.

Developing the Special Topics Course (EDUC 714-3) for the Greek Language GCCI

EDUC 714-3: Special Topics - Curriculum and Instruction of Greek: Transformative Learning Designs for a Greek Language Pedagogy, is designed to enable cohort members to align program goals, learning designs, and desired student outcomes in teaching Greek as an additional language in diverse sociocultural environments; to function effectively as reflective practitioners; to work creatively in teams as collaborative professionals; to create purposeful, engaged learning experiences for students; to use the internet as a dialogical space for sharing with students and with other teachers; and to apply and enhance meaningful practices for the assessment and evaluation of student performance. As a result of participating in this course, it is intended that the Greek language teacher becomes a reflective designer of learning experiences (teacher as designer), whose classroom plans become shareable 'designs for learning.'

The proposed 3-unit course, EDUC 714-3, is already available through the SNF Centre for Hellenic Studies and would be transposable onto the CANVAS platform, which is now in general use in the Faculty of Education at SFU. (Though the New Media Lab at the SNF Centre for Hellenic Studies would

provide technical support free of charge, a provisional amount of \$3000 would be budgeted, in case of costs that might arise.)

An instructor with advanced understanding of both Modern Greek and Greek language curriculum and instruction would need to be sought to teach this course. The SNF Centre for Hellenic Studies would assist in locating possible applicants and evaluating applications for this teaching assignment. For example, the SNF Centre for Hellenic Studies is in regular contact with Dr. Eugenia Arvanitis of the University of Patras, Greece and RMIT (Australia) who is qualified to teach the course. If the Greek Language GCCI online cohort program were to run twice, then, prior to any further cohorts, a course proposal for a regularized version of EDUC 714-3 for this specific variation would need to be submitted to SGSC. Also, a program change proposal would then need to be submitted to SGSC, in order to change the course requirement list to reflect the new regularized course, instead of EDUC 714-3.

Developing and Teaching EDUC 816, EDUC 820-5, and EDUC 823-5

EDUC 816-5, EDUC 820-5, and EDUC 823-5 would all need to be developed in suitable on-line formats on the CANVAS platform. The New Media Lab at the Centre for Hellenic Studies estimates that, with them contributing the technical assistance as their part of the partnership, each of these courses can be developed at a cost of \$5000, or less, to cover the expenses of generating the content. The first of these courses to be offered, which would set the pattern for the program's on-line course design, would need to be completed prior to the start of the program, while the other two could be developed subsequently, in sequence, provided that each course would be fully developed prior to its start date.

As with the specialty MEd programs in Curriculum and Instruction offered through Community Graduate Programs, the GCCI in *Teaching Greek as an Additional Language* would rely on tenure track members of the faculty of education, lecturers, professors emeriti, adjunct professors, and/or sessional instructors. Selection of instructors for EDUC 816-5, EDUC 820-5, and EDUC 823-5 would depend on each individual's availability to participate in the development of the online version of the particular course during the months leading up to the on-line start date of the course.

Instructors for these courses would be selected from pools of individuals who have taught these MEd courses within Community Graduate Programs or in similar contexts.

Adjunct Professors: Jean Warburton, Celia Lewis The GCCI in *Teaching Greek as an Additional Language* would present participating instructors with a timely opportunity to design the on-line versions of EDUC 816-5, EDUC 820-5, and EDUC 823-5 to align with and exemplify the 'program goals' that are currently emerging for the Curriculum and Instruction C&I programs offered through Community Grad Programs.

To this end, the development and delivery of these on-line versions would be overseen by a cohort Site Sponsor responsible to the Faculty of Education's Director Of Graduate Programs, and with the support of the Assistant Director of Graduate Programs.
