Ethical issues related to public health as they are located in and influenced by a global context. Consideration of several ethical approaches including utilitarianism, deontic ethics, and the capabilities approach, as well as theories of justice. Application of approaches to topics ranging from global markets in human organs to international migration of health workers and pharmaceutical testing in the Developing World. Students who have taken HSCI 320 or PHIL 327 may not take this course for further credit. Prerequisite: 60 units and one of of completed course work and PHIL 120 W (or equivalent), 121, or 221; or HSCI 319W.

SAMPLE

POL 223 Canadian American Political Economy (3)

An introductory study of America's Ganada's political economy, stressing the interrelated nature of Canada's economic and political life. The course Focuses on current economic problems and policies, taking into account the geographical, historical and political environments. Topics include the resource and industrial structures, research and development, the public sector, fiscal and monetary policy, the role of the state, trade and foreign ownership, energy, regional disparity, corporate concentration and the political economy of federalism.

This course is identical to CNS 280 and students cannot take both courses for credit.

Students with credit for CNS 280 cannot take POL 223 for further credit.

Recommended-Pre-requisite: POL 100 or 101W.
