Lower division Anthropology requirements changed from 16 to 14 units; Lower division Archaeology requirements changed from 12 to 15 units;


The revised calendar entry and approval email from ARCH are attached.

Enclosed, please find proposed changes to the Undergraduate Urban Studies Certificate. These changes were developed by the Undergraduate Urban Studies Certificate Steering Committee and were approved by the Department of Geography, the unit charged with administering the certificate, at its meeting of April 16, 2015. Letters of support are attached from partner units, Sociology/Anthropology and Political Science.

It has been ten years since this certificate was last refreshed. The changes proposed here aim to: (1) offer students a greater array of courses, from a greater array of units, than is currently available; and (2) allow them more flexibility in shaping a program to meet their needs/interests.

Among more specific changes are these:

- Deletion of the 'admission requirements'.... Students are responsible for meeting any prerequisites required for courses used toward the certificate. That said, the current admission requirements are discriminatory. For example, students who enroll in GEOG 261 as part of the Certificate must first take GEOG 100, which therefore functions as a prerequisite; in contrast, students who take 261 outside the Certificate have three possible choices of prerequisite. Again, SA 201W taken within the Certificate requires a preliminary course; if taken outside the Certificate, it does not. These inequities are hard to justify. Worth adding: the large majority of certificates on campus have no course-based admission requirements.
- Deletion of the 'techniques course'.... Rationale: any direct connection to urban issues is generally tenuous; moreover, students confront techniques courses as part of their major.
- Addition of a required course on global socio-economic trends.... This provides context for better understanding contemporary urban processes.

• Aggregation of most courses into a single cluster or 'block' from which choices are made.... This should facilitate students finding suitable courses in a given term.

Note: there is no change to the requirement that students can take a maximum of four courses within any single department. This promotes an interdisciplinary approach to the city.
