
Please remember to complete and return your Personal Data Questionnaire if you haven't already done so. The information about your interests and skills is important to our final planning.

Dear Environmental Education Student:

Hello! This letter is to provide you with some updated information about the Summer Institute in Environmental Education for July 1992.

We have concluded negotiations with the Langley School District to bese the Summer Inclitute out of Brookswood Secondary School. This location affords access to a diverse range of environments. We will have use of several classrooms, the library, a resource-reading room and a computer lab consisting of twenty-five Mac Plus computers. The school has tennis courts on its grounds and is within walking distance of most other urban amenities. We do ask that you bring your own mug and endeavour to obtain a hard-cover field book or journal with plain paper inside.

Planned field excursions will take us to a variety of locations and current plans include at least one overallohit excursion scheduled for July 9 and 10. Your field activity fee helps to defray some of the added costs entailed in offering a course such as this with a field travel component. It will not, however, cover all field travel and course participants may be required to pay for some transport costs including ferry travel. Day to day excursions in the local area will involve some use of your own transportation. Car pooling arrangements should enable us to reduce some of the associated costs and pollutents!

The Institute will be very intensive and pack a great deal of experience into a short time period. Formal sessions will generally run from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Tuesday through Thursday. Several activities, one of which is the overnight fieldtrip, may require some extended days and/or use of an additional weekday. A full schedule of activities will be provided at our first meeting: Tuesday, June 30 at 8:30 a.m. in the Brookswood staffroom.

The course will take a broadly interdisciplinary perspective, and will attempt to relate to teaching from K to Adult levels, in both school and non-school settings. We will try to focus on local natural and human-made environments as vehicles for enhancing the curriculum and student thinking. Our goal will be to give you the opportunity to extend your horizons, to build on existing skills, to share your experiences and your expertise, and to gain new skills.

While course projects, essignments and evaluation will be discussed in detail on opening day, we are esking you to complete a task prior to June 30. You are esked to bring and ENVIRONMENTAL BOX for opening day. This is merely a container in which you have placed a variety of 'things' representing your perceptions, attitudes, values and thoughts about the environment. You may even wish to develop a theme to show who you are end the way you think about the environment. The number of items in the box must not exceed your age divided by four and should include at least one item that has been created by yourself. Be prepared to share!

In previous years we have eaked participants in the institute to complete personal data questionnaires, and this year we are continuing with this practise. The questionnaire form allows us as instructors the chance to take an inventory of your expectations, needs, and personal resources.


