A minimum GMAT score of 600 and five on analytical writing is required. Interviews and a statement of interest are used to determine a fit between students and faculty.

In general, a minimum GMAT score of at least 650 or a GRE score of at least 320 and a master's degree CGPA of at least 3.50/4.33 or a bachelor's degree CGPA of at least 3.67/4.33 are required. However, all exceptional applicants will be considered.

Applicants' capability to undertake substantial original research will be judged from statement of research intent, reference letters, and interviews.

Graduate elective course work must be approved by the supervisor to create a curriculum which will be flexible within certain limits. Those who have already done graduate study in business, or a related field may request to be exempt or to substitute some of the course work in consultation with the director of the PhD program. Students who lack a business degree may, at the discretion of the PhD Program Director, be asked to complete up to four additional graduate courses beyond the program requirements.

Comprehensive Examination

Students will choose two areas in which they will take their comprehensive examinations. The reading list for the comprehensive exam will be a subset of the reading assignments in the Beedie School of Business graduate courses, special topics, as well as approved graduate courses in other programs or universities. Students prepare two thematically organized bibliography/reading lists. They should reflect the significant works in the areas in which the student is to be examined. They should also provide a foundation for research in these areas. The lists must be submitted to the PhD program administration and the student's supervisory committee for approval.

Research Seminar Courses

Students in their second through fourth years of studies are required to enrol in research seminar course each year. Students will contribute to the seminar series by inviting guest speakers and presenting their own work.

Summary of change:

Introduction of a course intensive option for the MA in History and an accelerated MA

Rationale for change:

The changes will meet the needs of a more diverse group of students and will give students a more flexible, and time-efficient path to the completion of a graduate degree. They will allow the department of History to attract a bigger cohort of students by allowing the department to consider applications for fields where work on an original thesis is very difficult due to requirements of language, difficulties in archival work and so on without unduly straining the capacity of the department, and will also help to reduce the average time to graduation of the Department's graduate students. The option will be of particular benefit to foreign students, who already constitute the bulk of History's applications.

The prospectus workshop, HIST 815, helps students prepare to research and write their theses. Students receive a satisfactory or unsatisfactory grade for this course. At the conclusion of the workshop, students defend their prospectuses to their committees in a formal setting.

When students have completed course work, they research and write their theses while enrolled in HIST 898. The thesis should be between 15,000 and 21,000 words, including footnotes (excluding bibliography). A shorter or longer thesis may be submitted only with the graduate chair's approval. If a thesis will exceed the word limit, the graduate chair must give formal approval prior to scheduling the defence.

Supervisors will submit their recommendation in writing to the GPC for approval by the end of the first semester.
