
Subj.: Proposed Revisions to
Certificate Requirements

Date: September 30, 1988

At a meeting on September 28, 1988, the Chinese Studies Certificate Program Steering Committee approved the following revisions to the requirements for the Certificate. These revisions result from the changes in Chinese language courses presently being considered by the Faculty of Arts Curriculum Committee.

1. Increase the core of the Certificate from 15 to 17 hours and the total semester-hours required for the Certificate from 21 to 23 hours. (This results from CHIN 100 and CHIN 102 being increased from 3 to 4 hours.)
2. Delete CHIN 250-3 from the elective courses and add CHIN 201-3 and CHIN 202-3. (CHIN 250 is being deleted and replaced by CHIN 201 and CHIN 202.)

No other changes in the Certificate requirements are needed. Please let me know if any additional information would be helpful.

CHINESE CALENDAR CHANGES

FROM:

CHIN 100-3 MANDARIN CHINESE I

Aquisition of spoken fluency and elementary writing.

(Lecture/Tutorial)

TO:

CHIN 100-4 MANDARIN CHINESE I

Introduction to the pinyin romanization system, the basic speech sounds of Mandarin, the Chinese writing system as well as the aquisition of some situational dialogues.

(Lecture/Tutorial, Monitored Lab)

Prerequisites: Students who can read or write Chinese or who speak Mandarin can not register for this course.

FROM:

CHIN 101-3 MANDARIN CHINESE II

Continuation of the work of CHIN 100-3. It should be taken, wherever possible, in the semester immediately following CHIN 100-3.

(Lecture/Tutorial)

Prerequisites: CHIN 100

TO:

CHIN 101-4 MANDARIN CHINESE II

Continues to build on all four language skills acquired in CHIN 100.

(Lecture/ Tutorial/Monitored Lab)

Prerequisites: CHIN 100 or equivalent

FROM:

CHIN 102-3 MANDARIN CHINESE II (CHINA)

Further acquisition of spoken fluency and elementary writing in Mandarin Chinese. This course will be taught at a university in China.

(Lecture/Tutorial)

Prerequisites: CHIN 100 and 30 semester hours.

TO:

102-4 MANDARIN CHINESE II (CHINA)

Further acquisition of spoken fluency and elementary writing in Mandarin Chinese. This course will be taught at a university in China.

(Lecture/ Tutorial/Monitored Lab)

Prerequisites: CHIN 100

RATIONALE: These courses have an exceptionally heavy workload. The instructor wishes to add a mandatory language lab for the format of the course. Other introductory language courses are four credits because of the heavy workload.

NEW COURSES

CHIN 151-3 SPOKEN MANDARIN FOR SPEAKERS OF OTHER CHINESE DIALECTS

This course is especially designed for native speakers of Chinese dialects other than Mandarin who, though able to read and write Chinese fluently, have no knowledge of spoken Mandarin.

(Lecture/ Tutorial/Monitored Lab)

Prerequisites: Ability to read and write Chinese. Ability to speak a dialect of Chinese other than Mandarin.

RATIONALE: However since Mandarin is the official dialect of Chinese it is required for students who wish to travel or work in China.

CHIN 201-3 MANDARIN CHINESE III

Continues to build on all four skills of the language acquired in CHIN 101/102, with special emphasis on improving the students' spoken facility in the language.

(Lecture/ Tutorial/Monitored Lab)

Prerequisites: CHIN 101 or 102 or equivalent.

CHIN 202-3 MANDARIN CHINESE IV

Continues to build on all four skills of the language acquired in CHIN 201, with special emphasis on improving the students' spoken facility in the language.

(Lecture/ Tutorial/Monitored Lab)

Prerequisites: CHIN 201 or equivalent.

RATIONALE: These courses will provide a full two years instruction in Chinese for SFU students which should give them a level of competence to use the language.

DELETE:

CHIN 250-3 Reading and Writing Chinese I

RATIONALE: This course has been replaced by CHIN 201 and 202.

CHINESE 151-3
SPOKEN MANDARIN FOR SPEAKERS OF OTHER CHINESE DIALECTS

Prerequisite: none

Course Description:

This course is specially designed for native speakers of other Chinese dialects who, though able to read and write Chinese fluently, have no knowledge of Mandarin. The philosophy underlying such a course is that learning to speak Mandarin is almost the same as learning a new language. Contrasts between Mandarin and other dialects, especially Cantonese, will be made: pronunciation, diction, idiomatic expressions and subtle differences in grammar -- aspects that native speakers of other dialects are likely to have the most difficulty with. Instruction will stress pronunciation through the medium of Hanyu Pinyin rather than Chinese characters. All classroom activities will be conducted in Mandarin, with active participation expected of the students.
