\*Students who can demonstrate proficiency in a high level programming language may be allowed to enter CMPT 118-3 without taking CMPT 103-3.

Rational

An increasing number of students entering the university have already acquired a working knowledge of computer programming, and for them CMPT 103-3 is unsuitable.
