

GERONTOLOGY 401 - Aging and the Auit Environment

# Course Description

Impact of the macro- and micro-environment as it affects the aged. This course will include discussion of planned housing and institutional living arrangements, territoriality and the need for privacy, home range and use of space, urban planning, responsive design of housing and care facilities, effects of relocation and institutionalization.

Prerequisites: 60 semester hours credit. Recommended: GERO 300

# Course Format

The class will meet twice a week. The general seminar format will be interspersed with field trips designed to familiarize students with various types of physical solutions to problems of daily living encountered by the aged.

# Distribution of Marks

Each student will be required to participate in a group research project and complete a final examination. The group research project will count for 50% of the final grade in the course; a final examination will provide the other 50%.

# Group Research Projects

The purpose of the group research project is to provide the student with first-hand experience in designing and conducting research relating to aging and the environment. It is hoped that this experience will make the readings and classroom discussions more meaningful and relevant, as well as give the student greater awareness of the life-styles, problems and treatment of the aged in our community.

# Group Research Projects (continued)

# a) Composition of Group

No attempt will be made to assign students to research groups. It will be the students' responsibility to find others with whom they can work. The total membership of any one group should not exceed five (5) persons.

# b) Selection of Research Problem

Each group will be free to select its own research problem. In selecting a problem, the following considerations should be kept in mind:

- 1) is it relevant to a course on environment and aging?
- 2) is it readily testable?
- 3) can the testing be conducted within a reasonable period of time?
- does it require elaborate equipment?
- 5) do the procedures required to investigate the problem meet ethical standards?

# c) Submission of Research Proposal

Each group will be required to submit a research proposal, which must be approved by the instructor, prior to conducting the study. The research proposal should contain the following information:

- 1) a statement of the problem to be investigated;
- 2) a summary of prior research on the topic;
- 3) a fairly detailed description of the proposed methodology, including:
  - i) the number and type of subjects and how they will be obtained (note: 20-40 will generally suffice for projects of this type);
  - ii) the measures that will be used;
  - iii) the procedures to be followed in conducting the study, including those designed to safeguard subjects' confidentiality

NOTE: Proposals and final reports should follow APA standards and styles. A guide for writing experimental reports based on the APA model is available from the instructor.
