# Education 474: Designs For Learning - Social Science Summer Session 1977

Instructor: J. Peter Rothe

Summer session will be centered around a "practical" and "critical" approach to the elementary social studies classroom. Priority will be given to active student involvement in classroom discussion and workshop activities.

The following is a general outline of suggested topics for discussion:

The Provincial Curriculum Guide (A critical analytical look; CORE vs. BCTF Reprt etc.)

Planning (teacher activities, student activities, displays and intents)

Inquiry (problem-solving, decision-making etc.)

Objectives (behavioral, cognitive, affective)

Unit Designs (modules, community involvement, ethnic treatment etc.)

Simulations (role playing, gaming, simulated activities etc.)

Field Trips (approaches, perspectives on seeing, relevance, etc.)

Questioning and Questions (levels of questions, timing, etc.)

Evaluation Procedures (types of testing, why's of evaluating, timing, etc.)

The aforementioned topics are only suggestions. Preference will be given to concerns or topics of interest expressed by students.

Textbooks: No official textbook will be required. A selected bibliography will be presented to the students at the first meeting.

#### Assignments:

- l. From a selected bibliography two book reviews (maximum of four pages each) are to be completed. Approximately two pages should be allotted for the uncovering off the book's main argument. The other two pages should be used to relate the book's argument to social studies instruction.
- 2. A group presentation based don a lesson design. This assignment will incorporate many of the topics discussed.
  - 3. A unit plan.

Further clarification will be given when classes commence.

#### CURRICULUM OUT LINE:

THE BEGINNING TEACHER NEEDS MORE THAN ONE "MARKETABLE" CURRICULUM ARRA. OFTEN IN THE FIRST YEAR OF TEACHING, ONE MUST BE PREPARED TO TEACH IN SEVERAL DIFFERENT

COURSES, AND AS MANY AS THREE DIFFERENT CURRICULUM

AREAS

THIS COURSE WILL OFFER SKILLS IN SIX CURRICLEUM AREAS, WITH STUDENTS BEING ENCOURAGED TO WORK AT SOME DEPTH IN AT LEAST TWO + POSSIBLY THREE AREAS.

- 2. STUDENTS NEED TO BE ABLE TO USE CEARNING PARATEGIES AND TEACHING SKILLS WHICH THE CROSS-DISCIPLINARY. THIS COURSE WILL HAVE A CORE WHICH ALL STUDENTS WILL BE MEKED TO TAKE. THIS PORTION OF THE COURSE WILL AIM FOR COMPETENCY IN QUESTIONING STRATEGIES, RESPONSE STRATEGIES, VALUE CLARYFYING STRATEGIES, AND METHODS OF EVALUATION!
- 3. STUDENTS NEED TO BE AWARE OF THE PROBLEMS AND NEEDS OF THE ADOLESCENT, AND THE PROGRAM DESIGNS POSSIBLE FOR MEETING THESE CONSTRUCTIVELY AND CREATILECY.
- 4. STUDENTS NEED TO BE AWARE OF THE CRITICISM DIRECTED AT THE TRADITIONAL SECONDARY SCHOOL AND SOME OF THE PROPOSED CHANGES.
- 5. STUDENTS NEED TO BE AWARR OF ALTERNATIVES TO TRADITIONAL SECONDARY SCHOOLING, AND MIGHT BEGIN TO EQUIPTHEMSELVES TO FUNTION IN SOME PART OF THE WIDE SPECTRUM FROM WORKING IN AN ACTERNATILE CLASSROOM IN A TRADITIONAL SCHOOL TO WORKING IN A FULLY ALTERNATIVE SCHOOL

THE COURSE WILL BE TRUGHT BY PEOPLE WHO HAVE ALL WORKED BOTH WITHIN THE TRADITIONAL SECONDARY SCHOOL SYSTEM AND HAVE TAUGHT IN ALTERNATIVES WITHIN THAT SYSTEM.

STUDENTS NEED CURRICULUM DESIGN SKILLS IF THEY ARE GOING TO FUNCTION CREATIVELY AND PURPOSEFULLY IN SECCNDARY EDUCHTION.

STUDENTS WILL BE EXPECTED TO DEMONSTRATE ABILITY IN UNIT PLANNING IN TWO DIFFERENT CURRICULUM AREAS

STRUCTURE:

THE COURSE WILL OPERATE 31/2 DAYS PER WEEK FROM MAY 2 TO JUNE 18th.

THE CURRICULUM AREAS WHICH WILL BE COVERED ARE: ENGLISH, SOCIAL STUDIES, MATHEMATICS, FINE AKTS SCIENCE AND GUIDANCE. THEY WILL BE TAUGHT USING A CENTERS APPROACH.

COURSE PARTICIPANTS WILL BE REQUIRED TO COMPLETE A SERIES OF READINGS +CURRICULUM-CENTERED TASKS. ALSO TO ATTEND + DRESENT SEMINARD ON SECONDARY 153UE3.
