This course acquaints intermediate level students in film, video and theatre with techniques of dramatic film performance. Students will be expected to perform as both actors and directors on scene work in class. Topics covered include auditioning, script analysis, role preparation, rehearsal, blocking for the camera, and directing techniques. This course is not a duplicate of FPA 339 Selected Topics in Film, available in summer 1990 and earlier. Prerequisite: REQ-FPA 231 or FPA 251; or FPA 131 or FPA 151 and prior approval.

This course acquaints intermediate level students with techniques of dramatic film performance. Students will be expected to perform as both actors and directors on scene work in class. Topics covered include auditioning, script analysis, role preparation, rehearsal, blocking for the camera, and directing techniques. **School for the Contemporary Arts
Academic Continuance Policy**

The SCA has added more details to the BFA Academic Continuance Policy for greater efficiency in monitoring students GPA performance. The additional information includes timelines for students who lose their status as a major and wish to increase their GPA to return to the major.

<p>Academic Continuance Policy:</p> <p>After a student has declared a major in Contemporary Arts, he or she will need to maintain their BFA Program GPA (FPA) at a minimum of 3.0. Maintenance of the BFA Program GPA level will be evaluated at the end of the First and 2nd academic years, normally at the end of the Spring Semester. A student who falls below a BFA Program GPA of 3.0 will meet with an advisor and normally be removed from the Major and placed in the Extended Minor. If the student has finished first year they will normally have one year to increase the BFA Program GPA to 3.0 or above in order to re-establish the major. If the student has finished second year they will need to meet with the Area Coordinator and Advisor to determine a plan if the BFA Program GPA can be raised, if the major can be re-established and plan their academic career for either re-establishing the Major or pursuing the Extended Minor. Students that are not successful in maintaining the BFA Program GPA required for the major will be changed to the extended minor program by an</p>	<p>Contemporary Arts – BFA Academic Continuance Policy: Declaration and continuation of Major in the School for the Contemporary Arts</p> <p>Policy: All BFA students who successfully complete the acceptance process within the School for the Contemporary Arts are offered the status of ‘Major’ in a specific area of study entering the first year. In order to remain a major, all students are required to maintain a cumulative GPA in FPA courses of 3.0. Students that fall below the 3.0 will have a limited time to bring the average up before losing their status as a major.</p> <p>Process: All SCA student GPA levels will be evaluated at the end of each academic year, normally at the end of the Spring semester. A student who falls below the required cumulative GPA in FPA courses of 3.0 will be notified of their probation status as a major with a limited time to adjust their FPA GPA. Students will need to meet with the Area Coordinator and Advisor and plan their academic career for either re-establishing the Major or pursuing an FCAT BA with a double minor</p>

<p>advisor. Students, through advising, will have the option of pursuing the extended minor as part of the double minor BA option in FCAT, or via other options in the university.</p>	<p>program. If the student does not bring the cumulative GPA in FPA courses to 3.0 in the allotted time, he/she will be dropped from the major.</p> <p>If the student is in first or second year of study within the major and falls below the required cumulative GPA in FPA courses of 3.0, the student will have two semesters to bring up their average to 3.0. If the student is in third year of their major, they will have one semester to bring their average to 3.0.</p> <p>Students who lose their status as a major in the SCA will have the option of pursuing the extended minor as part of the double minor BA option in FCAT, or via other options in the university.</p>
