Calendar Entry Change Name of Program or Name of Faculty: Philosophy Honours

Rationale for change:

We wish to make a number of changes, which I will explain separately.

- (1) The most important proposed change is this. The Philosophy Department's 400-level courses are taught concurrently with graduate level courses: undergraduate students share the seminar room with MA students. The standard in these courses is consequently extremely high. We believe that these seminars are our best tool for cultivating our most advanced undergraduates' philosophical knowledge and skills, and that our honours students should be required to take more of them. What's more, in view of the dialogic nature of our subject, we think it desirable for our honours students to spend more time in seminar discussions. We would therefore like to increase from one to three the number of such courses required for our honours program.
- (2) We propose a concomitant reduction in the honours tutorials: A three credit course, PHIL 479, will replace PHIL 477 and PHIL 478. The change is more efficient in its use of faculty time and will allow the program to grow. The new three-unit honours tutorial parallels the Linguistics Department's course *LING 490: Honours Essay (3)*.
- (3) We believe that our honours students should no longer be required to complete 132 units for their degrees. Only one other FASS unit imposes this onerous requirement, and the justification for it is unclear.
- (4) Students should be required to complete 48 upper division philosophy units, not 50. This will bring the Philosophy Honours program into line with FASS's requirements, and with honours programs in the majority of other FASS units.

BACHELOR OF ARTS

This program is for students who are capable of self-direction who wish to pursue advanced work in philosophy with the benefit of individual attention.

Normally a 3.5 grade point average (GPA) or higher in upper division philosophy courses is expected for entrance and continuance but does not by itself guarantee either.

A grade point average of 3.5 or higher in upper division philosophy courses, and a grade point average of 3.0 or higher in all philosophy courses, is required for entrance and continuance, but does not by itself guarantee acceptance or continuance.

To enrol, students should write to the Philosophy Department's Undergraduate Chair, who will provide an application form. The Philosophy Department's Undergraduate Curriculum Committee decides who is admitted to the program.
