RE: Visiting Undergraduate Course

Motion:

“that SCUS approve under delegated authority the creation of an undergraduate visiting research course (UGRAD 400) that denotes full-time engagement in academic research at the undergraduate level and that all Undergraduate Visiting Research Students must register for this course.”

Rationale

For many years, SFU faculty members and departments have been inviting undergraduate students, many of them international who are normally enrolled in institutions outside of Canada, to conduct short-term research under their supervision. Examples of these include Mitacs Globalink Research interns, DAAD RISE interns, and undergraduate students conducting research as part of their educational requirements for their home institution (e.g. from France, Germany, United Kingdom, etc.).

Ensuring that these visiting undergraduate researchers are admitted and enrolled as students engaged in full-time research allows them to apply for a Canadian Study Permit, facilitating SFU’s ability to properly report their activities as part of our enrollment reporting to Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC). There have been many recent changes to Federal immigration policies and procedures relating to international students and workers in Canada, and the continually evolving situation makes it necessary for SFU to have greater oversight over international students being invited to SFU in order to ensure compliance with immigration and employment law, and SFU policies. In 2006 Senate approved the establishment of GRAD 800-0 to accommodate visiting graduate students in a similar fashion.

Formalizing the admission of these visiting undergraduate research students provides SFU with the opportunity to better vet, track and support these students, as well as these types of activities, as part of SFU’s research and internationalization agenda. Many of these visiting students and researchers often apply to become degree seeking students at SFU, making the short-term visit a useful recruitment pathway.

Notes:

1. Students will be provided with a transcript listing this course, and that will be official confirmation of their participation in research activity at SFU.
2. Visiting research students will not be charged tuition fees, but they will pay student services and recreation-athletics fees, because they will have the opportunity of accessing those services. It may be possible for them to obtain U-Pass, but this will depend upon their date of arrival.
3. Visiting research students may not take other courses. Should they wish to do this, they would be admitted as exchange students.
